I am delighted to be writing this column with my windows wide open, warm air filling the room, and sounds of happy children and singing birds ringing



in my ears! Together, we enter spring. Seasons are nature's way of marking time, at least in our corner of the world. Trees blossom and bloom, feeding those birds and spreading their seeds. Eventually, leaves shrivel and fall, as barren branches pause for the months of winter.

We just marked another important moment, another mark in the passage of time. This past month was the anniversary of church transitioning from in-person gatherings to online gatherings. Yes indeed, Spring has sprung, and it is a time of hope and planting seeds for the earth, (at least the northern hemisphere), and our Church. I have three topics to cover.

First, the yearly Canvass has already met its matching goal, and I have really enjoyed all the thoughtful and heartfelt testimonials during worship this month. Thank you all for your pledges, and thank you for sharing what Channing Memorial Church means to you.

Next, it may seem far in the future, but our annual congregational meeting on May 23rd is fast approaching. In addition to our usual slate of business, we will be holding two congregational votes. The first is for some technical changes to our Bylaws, which were going to be voted on in 2020, but, well, you know what happened. In April I will send out a summary of these proposed changes, along with a link to a "marked up" version of the Bylaws, for your reading pleasure.

The second vote will be on whether our Church will adopt the UUA's proposed 8th Principle:

"We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote: journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions."

In preparation for this vote, we have collectively done a lot of reading, listened to a lot of podcasts, and, of course, participated in a lot of discussions.

And last, but far from least, a possible opportunity for a 24/7 combined worship, classroom, office, and storage space has recently arisen and generated some buzz with the Board and Space Team. I emphasize that we are just beginning our investigations, that there is a lot of information that needs to be gathered, and that there are a lot of issues that need to be considered. Either way, I hope to have something more definitive to say in next month's column. In the meantime the Space Team will continue looking into separate Sunday morning worship and office/storage spaces.

Canvass Update

As of March 21, Channing Memorial Church has received 21 pledges to our annual operating fund totaling \$120,539, which represents 83% of our goal of \$145,000. These pledges include increases of \$16,097, so we have met our matching challenge of \$13,000, but we still need additional increases to reach our goal if you are able.

Me and White Supremacy

A small group of us read the book *Me and White Supremacy: Combat Racism, Change the World, and Become a Good Ancestor* by Layla F. Saad. It was written as a 28-day guide, but we met weekly to discuss groupings of the chapters. The meetings were intense but meaningful as we looked within ourselves to identify the impact of white privilege and white supremacy on our lives. Each person was willing to be vulnerable and share their thoughts honestly. This work was uncomfortable at times, but we all felt it was valuable to reflect on these ideas and work to dismantle racism in ourselves and in our community.

At the end, there was a call to action and we all listed specific things we could do such as attend local board meetings, write to our representatives about legislation that we find important, widen the circle of voices we listen to, and speak up when needed. Some of us, including me, have agreed to be accountability partners to encourage each other to fulfill our commitments. There will be a future small group reading and book discussion, so be on the lookout if you're interested!



MD Legislative Update





Several of the priority bills of the UU Legislative Ministry of MD, as of March 20, have successfully passed the House of Delegate or the Senate. Of note, immigrants' rights bills HB 16— Dignity Not Detention— passed the full House with a veto-override majority and HB 23— Data Privacy— received a favorable report from the House Judiciary Committee and should be considered soon by the full House. Universal Representation, HB 750 / SB 317, unfortunately will not likely make it out of committee because of fiscal/budget implications, and the Trust Act, SB 88, as of March 20, is still sitting in the Senate Judicial Proceedings Committee. Several Climate Change bills— Climate Solutions Now and the Plastic Bag Reduction Act— have been successfully reported out of committees. And the current racist state song has been repealed.



At the March 16th meeting,



- The Board discussed hybrid worship and reopening. No timelines were set, and no concrete plans were made, but the Board felt it is important to get started thinking about this.
- The Board asked the Connections team to gather information about where the Church members are with respect to their health and COVID-19 immunizations.
- The Treasurer reported that the PPP loan forgiveness process continues to progress, albeit slowly.
- The Board was joined by the Space Team. The Space Team reported on their recent inquiries into Sunday morning rentals, and there was also discussion about a possible combined space that the Board and Space Team have recently been made aware of.

Here Come The Cicadas!

Has it been 17 years already? It's almost time for the Brood X periodical cicadas to emerge from the ground and raise a ruckus for a few weeks. Hooray!

Although we hear cicadas every summer, those are dog-day or annual cicadas. Periodical cicadas emerge every 17 years, with different broods emerging In different years. In Maryland, this year's Brood X is the largest group, last seen in 2004.

We'll see the adults emerge around mid-May. These cicadas will be smaller than the green dog-day cicadas, and they have more red-orange coloring. A week after emergence, the adult cicadas will mate and the females will deposit eggs at the ends of tree branches. The eggs hatch in six weeks and the young will drop to the ground where they burrow into the soil and feed on tree roots.

Cicadas and you:

- Cicadas don't bite or sting, and are harmless to people. They pose no health threat, but consumption in large numbers by pets should be discouraged.
- You may notice exit holes or "mud chimneys" in your lawn from the emerging nymphs. This will not permanently harm your lawn.
- Young cicadas feed on parts of trees, but there will be no lasting damage to established ones. If you have a new tree or a smaller ornamental or fruit tree, consider covering it with insect netting. If you're considering planting a new tree or shrub, you might want to wait until the fall.
- Cicadas will molt and leave the old shell behind. If you have a pond, consider covering it with screening during this time.
- Male cicadas have a droning mating song that you'll hear from trees. This can be a bit loud! Enjoy it while it lasts.
