Minister's Musings

Dear Channing members and friends,



Each time I venture into the outside world, I pause and take note of the cold – can I see my breath in this crisp, cool air? This December, I have embraced the night sky and the cycles of nature. After the recent winter solstice, as the days slowly become longer and nights grow shorter, we enter, together, into a new

year. Surrounded by brown foliage and frost covered grass, I invite us to pause and reflect on this cultural tradition: What resolutions can we make to carry into this New Year? Let us take an open and honest inventory of ourselves and see what attributes we want to grow and strengthen and note those which we would rather let go of. This becomes a reflection of our own inner workings, our faith, and on those inevitable transgressions. Together may we enter this year with faith, love, and compassion abundant.

I offer questions for each of us to reflect on, questions we will each have our own, unique and personal responses to: How can we foster more love in ourselves and share more love with the world? ian Universalists, we can see the inner, innate goodness in each person – which is not always easy. We can engage with the holy, pausing in prayer or breathing in meditation. We can intentionally connect, in each of our days, with all that brings us life, joy, purpose, and meaning.

And yet, we must know that we are all imperfect beings in this intimate and messy world. During our Hanukkah service, we talked about connecting with that still, small voice within – that light of love or compassion kindled in our hearts. I bring this sentiment to this reflection because all of us, to one degree or another, need that kindled light within to guide us back home. We are innately good, worthy, and loving, yes. And yet, simply through living in an imperfect world, we gather assumptions, prejudice, anger, and hate. We engage with the sin of individualism, focusing on self and not our patchwork of siblings. We get lost, but we can find our way back home – back to love, and that innate goodness. This year, may we find our way back home, over and over again, offering a new resolution every time we wander.

So may we carry this with us as we enter the New Year. May we feed that which fosters the good, the loving, and the beautiful. May we relinquish that which is harmful as we find our way home. May we delve deep into introspection as we each connect with our own unique, beautiful, imperfect selves. May this new year be one of love, compassion, faith, and awe.



In fact, a couple of friends and I swap funny and punny jokes via text regularly. I've been known to lean out the car window (Joe's driving) just to capture a snapshot when one appears on the sign at Clark's Ace Hardware on Route 40.

As much as this T-shirt tickles my funny bone, I also appreciate it for the insightful observations wrapped in its humor.

YOU MATTER. It's such a positive, affirming, and empowering message. One that's deeply resonant with the beliefs and values of our Unitarian Universalist faith. While "You matter" is not one of our principles, this statement undergirds them all.

Telling someone, "You matter," is the essence of our belief that every person is inherently worthy and has a right to live with dignity, love, and compassion. When individuals matter to us, we recognize the importance of creating safe and inclusive spaces for personal and spiritual growth. Our faith's "You matter" ethos reminds us to work toward a vision of Beloved Community worldwide.

YOU MATTER is a great message on its own, but another profound insight is hidden in the T-shirt's punchline. The joke reminds us that when we combine our energy and

enthusiasm with that of others, our efforts multiply. Individually, our contributions are valuable, but when combined with the energy of others, they hold the power of transformation.

I love moments of shared energy! In October, our Outreach Team sparked a wonderful moment of shared energy when they signed us up as an exhibitor at the HoCo Pride 2023 Festival. One small committee reached out to fellow Channingites (and their minister!), inviting them to contribute time and enthusiasm to make our presence at the event meaningful. Our church's energy merged with that of other exhibitors, sponsors, and participants, creating a celebratory afternoon in support of the LGBTQ+ community.

And while I'm no Einstein, in this example, I see the collective strength that emerges when we honor and combine our diverse gifts.

These moments of shared energy are more than just activities, and herein lies the final insight I see in our T-shirt.

Our T-shirt states that mass can be converted into energy and energy back into mass. In this interplay between individual and collective energy, the energy of each individual contributes to the collective energy of the group, and, in turn, this collective energy fuels the enthusiasm and energy of the individuals within the group. Planned Giving at Channing

Let's Consider Planned Giving

If you are like others in your church, you hold in your heart a desire to assure the future of Channing Memorial Church -- a community and a place where we invite seekers, connect souls, and ignite compassion-- for future generations. Planned giving gives us a path to reflect on that commitment.

Planned giving is a term used to describe a gift outside the annual pledge, at an amount generally larger than we might give out of our day-to-day income. The most traditional method is to include a specific bequest in our wills. Some members have already done that, and it is not difficult to do.

"We give to Unitarian Universalism because we value the hope of our denomination in these perilous times. We UUs are called to stand in love and justice, to be present and accounted for, to be a safe place for vulnerable people, to be a source of strength and love, to stand up to hate and bigotry and fear. This is why we come together, this is why we give generously – to pool our resources to bring about the world we seek." Whose quote???

Types of Giving You Might Consider

When daily worries about the economy, the political environment, and the cost of living make giving more out of ordinary income problematic, it is sometimes easier to think about including a more sizable bequest as part of our estate planning.

We encourage everyone to give it some thought and discuss the possibilities with your estate and/or tax advisor. A specific bequest can be included in your will. Please feel free to talk with any member of the Stewardship Committee if you have questions or thoughts about the idea. Year-end financial and tax planning is a normal exercise. Note however, we do not offer tax or financial planning advice and we do urge you to consult with your advisors.

You can contribute to the operating fund or the Vision and Growth fund.

- The operating fund contains the resources Channing uses for normal everyday expenses building, heat, salaries, administrative and program expenses.
- The Vision and Growth Fund is a special fund Channing has to support significant church initiatives which are not part of the normal operating fund budget such as the move to Corporate Court.

Additional options for giving before the end of the year or for planned giving at any time:

- Life insurance policies
- Charitable remainder trusts.

• People who need to complete their giving plans to meet their charitable contribution targets might want to give before the end of the year for the tax benefits to apply to the current tax year.

• Those age 70¹/₂ and older who must take Required Minimum Distributions (RMD)

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from their retirement accounts can transfer their RMDs directly to Channing, which for many can have tax benefits, even with the 2018 tax changes.

• Contributions can be made as a prepaid pledge for your future commitment to Channing. By doing so, you may be able to maximize your deductions in a particular tax year.

• Donating appreciated securities, such as publicly traded stocks or mutual funds, enables you to avoid paying tax on any gains while deducting the full value of the donated assets. Channing has a brokerage account that will accept securities. Please contact the Treasurer for details.

• Grants from Donor Advised funds are welcome, and of course members can replenish those funds with contributions in the current year or in future years. Qualitifed Charitable Distributions - from most IRAs directly to a charitable institution - can yield tax advantages to the donor. Click on this <u>IRS site</u> for details.

Channing Memorial Church, Unitarian Universalist

Our mission is to invite seekers into spiritual community, connect souls in mystery and wonder, and ignite compassion into action.

We are a church of liberal religious worship that inspires its members on their spiritual journeys. We derive a common spiritual center from Jewish and Christian roots while drawing inspiration from other world religions; promote religious education for all ages; create a welcoming, supporting, and caring community; and work together to build a better world.

We meet at Epiphany Lutheran Church, 9122 Sybert Drive, Ellicott City, MD 21043. Our Sunday worship service begins at 11:00 am.

Directions to Epiphany from the North on Route 29: Take Route 29 to Route 100 East, take first Exit Long Gate Parkway to stop sign (keep left at split). When traffic is clear, go straight across to Meadowbrook Lane, past the Park and Ride to the stop sign, turn right onto Sybert Drive; Epiphany will be on your right.

Directions to Epiphany from the South on Route 29: Take Route 29 to Route 108, head East on Route 108 to first traffic light (Bendix Road), turn left onto Edgar Road; at stop sign turn right, then in two blocks turn left onto Parkvale Road. Continue to stop sign, then turn left onto Sybert Drive. Epiphany will be on your right.
