

Let us welcome these glories of winter as we enter the New Year. Last month, we reflected on resolutions. I asked all of us, "How can we each, in our own way, engage with this introspection that can intentionally foster

strength, growth, and meaning?" This month I ask, "How can we each, in our own way, engage with the future of our church?"

We recently sent out a survey about our future with Epiphany Lutheran Church and received forty responses - remarkable! Know that your Board and I have been working diligently to read and reflect upon each comment. Know that not every concern can be addressed; we are not perfect, and neither is the space. The responses were quite positive. I invite all of us into a space of calm, curiosity, adventure, and introspection.

Early this month, our Lectio Divina group reflected upon a poem I find quite timely. Here is an excerpt of the poem "For a New Beginning" by John O'Donohue:

Board Bits



The Board discussed the results of the ELC Survey and next steps. The Board voted to pursue negotiating for a 5-year lease with Epiphany Lutheran.

The Board agreed to modify the masking policy to fit with the current context of most people being vaccinated. The old policy included distancing and only sharing food outside, among other restrictions. When the Covid level in Howard County is medium, people will be required to mask only while singing. Distancing is optional. A reminder too that if you are feeling sick, it is best to stay home rather than attend service in person.

Channing Inclement Weather Plan

_For a weekend where difficult weather is anticipated for Sunday:

1. Channing hopes to make a decision **by Friday noon** to allow time to pivot to Zoom for the Sunday Service.

2. If a decision cannot be made by Friday noon, we will follow the guidance of ELC.



***If building is closed by ELC, there will be no service that Sunday.

3. Channing will inform the Congregation through email, the website and Facebook when there is a change planned for the upcoming Sunday due to weather. The notice will be released as soon as possible after the decision is made.

4. ELC will make a decision about opening the building **no later than Sunday morn-ing at 8:30 a.m**. Ed of ELC will email worship@ and newsshare@. Channing will distribute that notice as soon as we can to our congregation.

President's Column

Dear Members and Friends,



The Board of Trustees extends their gratitude for your participation in our efforts to collect information about the congregation's perspective on a potential long-term lease with Epiphany Lutheran Church. Your presence at the Congregational Listening Session was truly valued, and we extend our appreciation for the 40 thoughtful survey responses and the comments shared through email and in conversations. Rest assured, our decisions will be anchored in our mission and vi-

sion, with a focus on the long-term health of the congregation. Your diverse perspectives have provided us with valuable insights as we do this important work.

The survey results highlighted several key themes that were also expressed during the Listening Session and in various conversations. A central theme that stood out prominently is the congregation's yearning for stability. Stability, many believe, would provide a solid foundation for channeling our resources and energy into our mission and vision rather than into a perpetual search for suitable space.

Many people emphasized that the stability offered by a long-term lease would enable us to dedicate ourselves to outreach work, aligning with our commitment to put compassion into action. Others stressed the importance of having a consistent, welcoming, and spiritually focused space to aid in inviting seekers into spiritual community. A familiar place would make it easier to manage and develop our use of technology to fully engage our online members and friends in worship, spiritual development offerings, and social activities. Still others pointed out that having a dependable location would

make carrying out our mission-driven activities easier.

Further comments included the idea that a stable and appealing space would help attract new members and retain our current congregants, as frequent moves can make it challenging to grow. Staying in one place would help us build a vibrant, active community to do the work that is important to us. A long-term lease's stability would support long-term planning and allow us to prioritize our strategic plan.

While acknowledging the advantages of a long-term lease, concerns were raised about ELC's building not being ideal for developing a religious education program for children and youth—one of the ways we have long desired to live up to our mission and vision. Additionally, significant concerns revolve around accessibility issues, with a clear emphasis on the absence of an accessible bathroom. Challenges related to sound accessibility and the difficulty stairs can present were also raised. These problems were seen as impeding our ability to offer a fully inclusive environment.

A strong majority of people indicated that to truly embody our mission and vision, it is important to have an accessible bathroom as part of any space we occupy for the long term, even if this means we have to finance a renovation ourselves. There was a willingness among respondents to work collaboratively with ELC, viewing the renovations as the right thing to do for the benefit of both congregations.

Along with comments of support, there were also reservations about making such an expensive investment in a building we don't own or have much say over, especially since ELC is unable to share the cost of renovations or reduce our rent in exchange for our investment because they recently had to use their reserve fund to replace the building's roof and heating system. Many people expressed the importance of having legal provisions for the reimbursement of renovation costs if the building is put up for sale or if our lease is terminated. The idea that we should not enter a long-term lease if the bathroom renovation is not possible was raised, as was the opinion that we should not invest in this renovation if our lease agreement is less than five years.

The results of the survey also indicated that there are several practical issues with our current use of the building. One of the concerns is whether ELC can ever be an "all-in-one" space to accommodate an office for Rev. Jane, a business office, and provide adequate storage space. Some respondents also pointed out concerns they are experiencing in the areas where they volunteer or are deeply engaged. Responses included that the start time of the service and the set-up time are not ideal and that we have limited access to the building during the week. Some expressed a desire for more autonomy in how the building is used and the ability to make it feel more like "home" with symbolism that reflects the diverse religious and spiritual experiences of Unitarian Universalists rather than just the Christian ones. Others would like to see improved signage outside and more of our things visible throughout the building. Additionally, people expressed concerns that the shared spaces, such as the Fellowship Hall, kitchen, and bathrooms, have cleanliness and maintenance issues.

Responses to the survey indicated a desire for a more extensive and collaborative partnership with ELC. Responses expressed the need for shared decision-making and

ongoing discussions to ensure the space meets our evolving needs and visions and that the two congregations have a mutually beneficial relationship. The potential for shared initiatives, services, and improvements was expressed, reflecting a belief that it makes sense for two small congregations to support one another.

The survey responses raised various financial considerations essential to ensuring our long-term sustainability. The primary issues highlighted were the funding of renovations, the ongoing costs of leasing office and storage space, and the costs of maintaining an old building. Additionally, survey responses noted future risks, such as the potential impact of Epiphany's financial situation on a long-term lease, alignment of expenses with Channing's anticipated income and reserves, possible rent increases, and unforeseen expenses. Several possible solutions were suggested to mitigate these risks, and there is widespread agreement that we must incorporate legal safeguards to protect our interests in any potential long-term lease agreement.

While there were questions about whether ELC's space could fully meet our long-term needs, most responses supported pursuing a long-term lease agreement. Some respondents expressed reservations but viewed this as our best option, with many believing ELC's shortcomings could be managed, especially within a five-year lease.

With these insights and this information, the Board voted to pursue negotiating a fiveyear lease with Epiphany Lutheran Church.

Our work on this process will begin right away and will be ongoing. Numerous aspects will require careful consideration as we enter discussions with ELC to determine the nature of their interest in a relationship with us, negotiate lease terms, and address congregational concerns. We will keep you updated through regular communication. We are preparing a quantitative data analysis of the survey results and will send out a link once it is completed. We greatly value your support as we navigate this journey and work to secure a space that meets our needs and aligns with the shared vision and values of our church community. We sincerely appreciate your ongoing dedication and commitment to Channing Memorial Church.

Combating Fascisms Without & Within: An Organized UU Response

Dear Channing members and friends,

Fascism is a current, true threat to our nation and the world. During the last General Assembly, ministers heard a presentation from Rev. Cecilia Kingman detailing this rise of fascism, how it works, and what we can do to counter it. I will offer a series of two classes to delve into this topic in greater depth.

PREREQUISITE: Read or watch the 2023 Berry Street essay, "My Little Pony Was Right: Reflections on Fascism Without & Within," by the Rev. Cecilia Kingman.

Building upon the reflections generated in Session 1, join the Side With Love team and special guests to discuss concrete organizing responses that congregations can take to counter fascism and build democracy and liberation in their own communities and across the country.


Our mission is to invite seekers into spiritual community, connect souls in mystery and wonder, and ignite compassion into action.



President's Column

Dear Members and Friends,



The Board of Trustees extends their gratitude for your participation in our efforts to collect information about the congregation's perspective on a potential long-term lease with Epiphany Lutheran Church. Your presence at the Congregational Listening Session was truly valued, and we extend our appreciation for the 40 thoughtful survey responses and the comments shared through email and in conversations. Rest assured, our decisions will be anchored in our mission and vi-

sion, with a focus on the long-term health of the congregation. Your diverse perspectives have provided us with valuable insights as we do this important work.

The survey results highlighted several key themes that were also expressed during the Listening Session and in various conversations. A central theme that stood out prominently is the congregation's yearning for stability. Stability, many believe, would provide a solid foundation for channeling our resources and energy into our mission and vision rather than into a perpetual search for suitable space.

Many people emphasized that the stability offered by a long-term lease would enable us to dedicate ourselves to outreach work, aligning with our commitment to put compassion into action. Others stressed the importance of having a consistent, welcoming, and spiritually focused space to aid in inviting seekers into spiritual community. A familiar place would make it easier to manage and develop our use of technology to fully engage our online members and friends in worship, spiritual development offerings, and social activities. Still others pointed out that having a dependable location would

make carrying out our mission-driven activities easier.

Further comments included the idea that a stable and appealing space would help attract new members and retain our current congregants, as frequent moves can make it challenging to grow. Staying in one place would help us build a vibrant, active community to do the work that is important to us. A long-term lease's stability would support long-term planning and allow us to prioritize our strategic plan.

While acknowledging the advantages of a long-term lease, concerns were raised about ELC's building not being ideal for developing a religious education program for children and youth—one of the ways we have long desired to live up to our mission and vision. Additionally, significant concerns revolve around accessibility issues, with a clear emphasis on the absence of an accessible bathroom. Challenges related to sound accessibility and the difficulty stairs can present were also raised. These problems were seen as impeding our ability to offer a fully inclusive environment.

A strong majority of people indicated that to truly embody our mission and vision, it is important to have an accessible bathroom as part of any space we occupy for the long term, even if this means we have to finance a renovation ourselves. There was a willingness among respondents to work collaboratively with ELC, viewing the renovations as the right thing to do for the benefit of both congregations.

Along with comments of support, there were also reservations about making such an expensive investment in a building we don't own or have much say over, especially since ELC is unable to share the cost of renovations or reduce our rent in exchange for our investment because they recently had to use their reserve fund to replace the building's roof and heating system. Many people expressed the importance of having legal provisions for the reimbursement of renovation costs if the building is put up for sale or if our lease is terminated. The idea that we should not enter a long-term lease if the bathroom renovation is not possible was raised, as was the opinion that we should not invest in this renovation if our lease agreement is less than five years.

The results of the survey also indicated that there are several practical issues with our current use of the building. One of the concerns is whether ELC can ever be an "all-in-one" space to accommodate an office for Rev. Jane, a business office, and provide adequate storage space. Some respondents also pointed out concerns they are experiencing in the areas where they volunteer or are deeply engaged. Responses included that the start time of the service and the set-up time are not ideal and that we have limited access to the building during the week. Some expressed a desire for more autonomy in how the building is used and the ability to make it feel more like "home" with symbolism that reflects the diverse religious and spiritual experiences of Unitarian Universalists rather than just the Christian ones. Others would like to see improved signage outside and more of our things visible throughout the building. Additionally, people expressed concerns that the shared spaces, such as the Fellowship Hall, kitchen, and bathrooms, have cleanliness and maintenance issues.

Responses to the survey indicated a desire for a more extensive and collaborative partnership with ELC. Responses expressed the need for shared decision-making and

ongoing discussions to ensure the space meets our evolving needs and visions and that the two congregations have a mutually beneficial relationship. The potential for shared initiatives, services, and improvements was expressed, reflecting a belief that it makes sense for two small congregations to support one another.

The survey responses raised various financial considerations essential to ensuring our long-term sustainability. The primary issues highlighted were the funding of renovations, the ongoing costs of leasing office and storage space, and the costs of maintaining an old building. Additionally, survey responses noted future risks, such as the potential impact of Epiphany's financial situation on a long-term lease, alignment of expenses with Channing's anticipated income and reserves, possible rent increases, and unforeseen expenses. Several possible solutions were suggested to mitigate these risks, and there is widespread agreement that we must incorporate legal safeguards to protect our interests in any potential long-term lease agreement.

While there were questions about whether ELC's space could fully meet our long-term needs, most responses supported pursuing a long-term lease agreement. Some respondents expressed reservations but viewed this as our best option, with many believing ELC's shortcomings could be managed, especially within a five-year lease.

With these insights and this information, the Board voted to pursue negotiating a fiveyear lease with Epiphany Lutheran Church.

Our work on this process will begin right away and will be ongoing. Numerous aspects will require careful consideration as we enter discussions with ELC to determine the nature of their interest in a relationship with us, negotiate lease terms, and address congregational concerns. We will keep you updated through regular communication. We are preparing a quantitative data analysis of the survey results and will send out a link once it is completed. We greatly value your support as we navigate this journey and work to secure a space that meets our needs and aligns with the shared vision and values of our church community. We sincerely appreciate your ongoing dedication and commitment to Channing Memorial Church.





Further comments included the idea that a stable and appealing space would help attract new members and retain our current congregants, as frequent moves can make it challenging to grow. Staying in one place would help us build a vibrant, active community to do the work that is important to us. A long-term lease's stability would support long-term planning and allow us to prioritize our strategic plan.

While acknowledging the advantages of a long-term lease, concerns were raised about ELC's building not being ideal for developing a religious education program for children and youth—one of the ways we have long desired to live up to our mission and vision. Additionally, significant concerns revolve around accessibility issues, with a clear emphasis on the absence of an accessible bathroom. Challenges related to sound accessibility and the difficulty stairs can present were also raised. These problems were seen as impeding our ability to offer a fully inclusive environment.

A strong majority of people indicated that to truly embody our mission and vision, it is important to have an accessible bathroom as part of any space we occupy for the long term, even if this means we have to finance a renovation ourselves. There was a willingness among respondents to work collaboratively with ELC, viewing the renovations as the right thing to do for the benefit of both congregations.

Along with comments of support, there were also reservations about making such an expensive investment in a building we don't own or have much say over, especially since ELC is unable to share the cost of renovations or reduce our rent in exchange for our investment because they recently had to use their reserve fund to replace the building's roof and heating system. Many people expressed the importance of having legal provisions for the reimbursement of renovation costs if the building is put up for sale or if our lease is terminated. The idea that we should not enter a long-term lease if the bathroom renovation is not possible was raised, as was the opinion that we should not invest in this renovation if our lease agreement is less than five years.

The results of the survey also indicated that there are several practical issues with our current use of the building. One of the concerns is whether ELC can ever be an "all-in-one" space to accommodate an office for Rev. Jane, a business office, and provide adequate storage space. Some respondents also pointed out concerns they are experiencing in the areas where they volunteer or are deeply engaged. Responses included that the start time of the service and the set-up time are not ideal and that we have limited access to the building during the week. Some expressed a desire for more autonomy in how the building is used and the ability to make it feel more like "home" with symbolism that reflects the diverse religious and spiritual experiences of Unitarian Universalists rather than just the Christian ones. Others would like to see improved signage outside and more of our things visible throughout the building. Additionally, people expressed concerns that the shared spaces, such as the Fellowship Hall, kitchen, and bathrooms, have cleanliness and maintenance issues.

Responses to the survey indicated a desire for a more extensive and collaborative partnership with ELC. Responses expressed the need for shared decision-making and

ongoing discussions to ensure the space meets our evolving needs and visions and that the two congregations have a mutually beneficial relationship. The potential for shared initiatives, services, and improvements was expressed, reflecting a belief that it makes sense for two small congregations to support one another.

The survey responses raised various financial considerations essential to ensuring our long-term sustainability. The primary issues highlighted were the funding of renovations, the ongoing costs of leasing office and storage space, and the costs of maintaining an old building. Additionally, survey responses noted future risks, such as the potential impact of Epiphany's financial situation on a long-term lease, alignment of expenses with Channing's anticipated income and reserves, possible rent increases, and unforeseen expenses. Several possible solutions were suggested to mitigate these risks, and there is widespread agreement that we must incorporate legal safeguards to protect our interests in any potential long-term lease agreement.

While there were questions about whether ELC's space could fully meet our long-term needs, most responses supported pursuing a long-term lease agreement. Some respondents expressed reservations but viewed this as our best option, with many believing ELC's shortcomings could be managed, especially within a five-year lease.

With these insights and this information, the Board voted to pursue negotiating a fiveyear lease with Epiphany Lutheran Church.

Our work on this process will begin right away and will be ongoing. Numerous aspects will require careful consideration as we enter discussions with ELC to determine the nature of their interest in a relationship with us, negotiate lease terms, and address congregational concerns. We will keep you updated through regular communication. We are preparing a quantitative data analysis of the survey results and will send out a link once it is completed. We greatly value your support as we navigate this journey and work to secure a space that meets our needs and aligns with the shared vision and values of our church community. We sincerely appreciate your ongoing dedication and commitment to Channing Memorial Church.





The Board discussed the results of the ELC Survey and next steps. The Board voted to pursue negotiating for a 5-year lease with Epiphany Lutheran.

The Board agreed to modify the masking policy to fit with the current context of most people being vaccinated. Dear Members and Friends,

Your presence at the Congregational Listening Session was truly valued, and we extend our appreciation for the 40 thoughtful survey responses and the comments shared through email and in conversations. Rest assured, our decisions will be anchored in our mission and vi-

sion, with a focus on the long-term health of the congregation. Your diverse perspectives have provided us with valuable insights as we do this important work.

The survey results highlighted several key themes that were also expressed during the Listening Session and in various conversations. A central theme that stood out prominently is the congregation's yearning for stability. Stability, many believe, would provide a solid foundation for channeling our resources and energy into our mission and vision rather than into a perpetual search for suitable space.

Many people emphasized that the stability offered by a long-term lease would enable us to dedicate ourselves to outreach work, aligning with our commitment to put compassion into action. Others stressed the importance of having a consistent, welcoming, and spiritually focused space to aid in inviting seekers into spiritual community. A familiar place would make it easier to manage and develop our use of technology to fully engage our online members and friends in worship, spiritual development offerings, and social activities. Still others pointed out that having a dependable location would

While there were questions about whether ELC's space could fully meet our long-term needs, most responses supported pursuing a long-term lease agreement. Some respondents expressed reservations but viewed this as our best option, with many believing ELC's shortcomings could be managed, especially within a five-year lease.

With these insights and this information, the Board voted to pursue negotiating a fiveyear lease with Epiphany Lutheran Church.

Our work on this process will begin right away and will be ongoing. Numerous aspects will require careful consideration as we enter discussions with ELC to determine the nature of their interest in a relationship with us, negotiate lease terms, and address congregational concerns. We will keep you updated through regular communication. We are preparing a quantitative data analysis of the survey results and will send out a link once it is completed. We greatly value your support as we navigate this journey and work to secure a space that meets our needs and aligns with the shared vision and values of our church community. We sincerely appreciate your ongoing dedication and commitment to Channing Memorial Church.

When traffic is clear, go straight across to Meadowbrook Lane, past the Park and Ride to the stop sign, turn right onto Sybert Drive; Epiphany will be on your right.

Directions to Epiphany from the South on Route 29: Take Route 29 to Route 108, head East on Route 108 to first traffic light (Bendix Road), turn left onto Edgar Road; at stop sign turn right, then in two blocks turn left onto Parkvale Road. Continue to stop sign, then turn left onto Sybert Drive. Epiphany will be on your right.
