President's Column



As I write this on a cold February morning, I know that there may be plenty of snowy and cold days ahead according

to the groundhog, but I find myself comforted by the inevitability of the coming Spring. Since I last wrote, our small, but lively and mighty Congregation has been busy. So without further ado, let's get to it.

The auction was very successful! I don't want to steal all the thanking thunder from the LDNC, but I'm going to steal a little... Thank you Colleen R. for being the main organizer and driving force behind this beloved event for the past several years. May you pass on your wisdom and talents to a worthy successor. Thank you auctioneer stalwarts Patrick B. and Ken K. And thank you H.-Vs, and Stephanie, Olivia, and Desmond B. for putting together the entertainment: the production, the music, the singing, the puppets, and the dance grooves all had me grinning constantly throughout. And last, but not least, I thank the Congregation for its generosity: we raised over \$5000 and had a fine time while doing so!

We just had a midyear Congregational Meeting. I'm pleased to report that our finances are in very good shape, and that we were able to further discuss and promulgate the Strategic Plan.

The 8th principle vote is still scheduled for March 20, and I've learned that more information about the details should be forthcoming. Keep an eye on your email inboxes.

And now to the first of the "perennial" topics: meeting in person. The pandemic metrics are trending significantly downward, and the Board has voted to begin in-person services again in March at Robinson Nature Center. We will be cautious at first, and there is some uncertainty as to whether March 6th or March 13th will be the first offering, so stay tuned.

Finally, the second "perennial" topic: space. The Board has voted to extend our lease at Park Avenue for another year. It disappoints me that we will have to continue to deal with its accessibility issues, but the rent is low, and this will also give the Space Team more "breathing room" in this difficult process. I don't want to say too much at this point in time, but it is looking like Robinson Nature Center may not be well-suited for our needs, especially those of hybrid-worship.

- The Board received an update on the work of the 8th Principle committee.
- Board discussed finding an auction coordinator for next year.
- Board discussed meeting in person. Using the Act Now risk assessment tool, the Board decided to restart hybrid worship meetings on Sunday, March 6th providing the metrics continue to decrease. RE will be offered as needed.
- Board received a report from the Space Team. On their recommendation, the Board decided to extend the lease at Park Avenue for another year.
- The Board discussed and finalized plans for the Mid-Year Budget review and Strategic Plan Meeting.

Pledge Campaign Kickoff March 13, 2022 "Joy in the Journey"

The Stewardship Committee faced an interesting challenge this year when deciding on the goal amount for this year's pledge drive, which starts mid-March. The commitments that people pledge in March and April are to pay for operating expenses the church will incur from July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023. Our current lease at Park Avenue ends April 30, and we have not yet secured office or worship space for next fiscal year, so that expense is a bit of an unknown.

I presented this chart after worship last Sunday. There are a few points I'd like to make about these charts.

If pledges remain at last year's level, then we will not be able to have full time in-person worship in a similar venue to Linden Hall. We would likely need to skip one or two Sundays of in-person worship each month. However, if we stay at Park Ave. and the rent is lower than it was pre-pandemic, and we reach the goal of \$155,000, we will be able to have a full time in-person worship experience. \$155,000 is about a 7% increase over last year pledges. The Stewardship Committee is committed to balancing our budget next year. With an average of a 7% increase in pledges, we can achieve that goal.
