Announcement from Your Board, aka Get Ready to —

Given the current guidance from public health officials, the board has decided that we will hold worship and meetings online until April 19, 2020. This decision will be reevaluated at the April 21 board meeting.

All teams and groups are encouraged to continue meeting with each other. Please consider moving your regular meetings online. We need to maintain our connections with one another.

The board has set up a paid Zoom account to be shared for all meetings held other than worship or minister-led meetings. This account can be used for board meetings, covenant circle, men's group, book club, youth, etc.

In order to hold a group meeting on Zoom for longer than 40 minutes, you have to have a paid account. This account allows us to host meetings for up to 100 people.

If you want to use this Zoom account to host a meeting, please email Julie with the date and time of your meeting. She will set it up on the calendar for you and send you the sign-in information. She will also provide you with the log-in and password of this host account so that you can log in and start your meeting.

Please be careful **not** to save this password and login to your personal computer. Remember to sign out of the account when you are finished with your meeting, and please don't change any subscription settings.

Julie will put together a basic instruction sheet on how to run the meeting if you are a host.

TIPS & INFO for New (and Other!) Pledgers



Greetings from your Finance Team! Here are some tips and tidbits to take the "mystery and wonder" out of giving to the church.

Fiscal year: Channing MC's financial year runs from July 1st to June 30th. Pledges people make in the spring apply to that period of time.

Where to give/send your contributions: Pledge donations and other contributions may be placed in the offering plate on Sundays. If mailing your contribution, please send it to:

Channing Memorial Church, 3677 Park Avenue, Ellicott City, MD 21043

How to give

Checks: If you're giving by check, please use the memo line to indicate what the check is for (e.g., "2020-21 pledge," or "annual pledge," etc.).

Cash: If you're giving toward your pledge by cash, please put the cash in an envelope, write your name and the date on the front, and drop it in the offering plate. Cash placed anonymously in the collection plate is simply recorded as "plate cash", not as money given toward pledges.

PayPal: Use your credit card or PayPal account to donate to Channing! Go to channingmc.org and select *Community*, then *Donations to Channing*. Follow the directions on the screen to complete the process.

Stock: Stock donations are a great way to give to the church. See Evelyn G. for more information.

Pledge donations vs. other donations

Donations to church funds other than the general operating fund, such as the Minister's Discretionary Fund or the Westside Shelter food fund, are accounted for separately from your pledge donations. When giving to a special collection for one of these other funds or causes, it's helpful to have a note in the memo line of the check stating the donation's purpose.

Annual and quarterly donation statements

In January, everyone who has given to the church in the past year-- regardless of whether they've pledged-receives a statement that shows their giving from January 1st through December 31st. This is a *calendar year statement* with no reference to the July-June fiscal year

People who have made donation pledges to the church also receive *quarterly statements* three additional times each year. These are given out sometime after September 30th, March 31st, and June 30th. These quarterly statements update pledged givers on how much they've given toward their pledges thus far, while also serving as a check on what the Treasurer has in the system. If you see something you believe is an error, please let the Treasurer know.

The timing of your contributions toward your pledge, throughout the fiscal year, is up to you; so, the reports put out in October and April are not to be construed as an indication of whether or not you are "behind" in pledge giving.

Podcasts Offer Erudite Entertainment In Closed-Down World



If current events have you squirreled away at home, looking for something to do, you may find it an auspicious time to check out some more spiritually-oriented podcasts.

Spirited Discussions

Robert Wright's Meaning of Life (MOL) podcast website (https://meaningoflife.tv/) offers a rich lode of intellectual discussion of cultural and spiritual issues. MOL is something of a spin-off from Bloggingheads (https://bloggingheads.tv/), which the former Atlantic editor co-founded with Mickey Kaus back in 2005 while podcasting was still in its infancy. It was one of the early adopters of the long-form format interviews/discussions (45 minute plus) that was subsequently embraced by enormously popular podcasts like the Joe Rogan Experience.

Though there's some overlap between the two sites, Bloggingheads focuses more on politics, while MOL is centered more on philosophical and spiritual matters. You can watch both MOL and Bloggingheads discussions online or download audio-only versions for more listening flexibility.

Robert Wright is not the only interviewer on MOL. There are a half dozen 'channels' on MOL featuring different interviewers and formats (though not all are still active). But I like Robert's droll interview style, which manages to be both sharp and gentle at the same time. He's not afraid to challenge his guests, but discussions rarely get heated, and he always maintains a good rapport with his subjects. He's also one of the few non-religious intellectual pundits who understands the importance of the issue of 'consciousness'/ subjective experience/'the mind body problem,' a fundamental mystery which science has yet to make a dent in.

I thought one archived MOL discussion from 2015 was particularly intriguing since many of the issues discussed seemed similar to those facing UU congregations. Robert interviews Judith Shulevitz (https://meaningoflife.tv/videos/31713) on her views of God and religion. Coming as she does from a liberal Jewish perspective, her observations on the challenges facing religions which are based more on action than belief, and which lacked the anchor of belief on which to ground the creation of community, resonated with some of the struggles I see taking place at Channing.

An In-Depth Import

Another podcast worth looking into is Ideas from the CBC (https://www.cbc.ca/radio/ideas). I've only listened to a few of its shows so far, but host Nahlah Ayed has impressed me with her deep approach to her topics, which cover the full gamut of social and cultural subjects. Some recent shows focused on Darwin's legacy, evangelism's impact on America, the fight for democracy, and psychology's current uncertainty about mental illness.

One recent episode I particularly enjoyed was from March 16: "The Saxophone and the Spirit: The Sax's Forgotten Spiritual Roots" (https://www.cbc.ca/radio/ideas/the-saxophone-and-the-spirit-the-sax-s-forgotten-spiritual-roots-1.5483769). I learned a lot about the history of the sax, as well being exposed to some intriguing musicians I'd never heard of. When I saw the title, I immediately thought of one of my favorite musicians, the Scandinavian Jan Garbarek, and I was amused to find he makes a brief appearance in the podcast.

Channing Joins Immigration Coalition

Channing Memorial Church has joined the Howard County Coalition for Immigrant Justice. The Coalition, a group of immigrants, individuals and concerned organizations ranging from the ACLU, Council of American Islamic Relations, Friends of Latin America as well as faith communities including the Columbia Jewish Congregation, Patapsco Friends Meeting House and the UU Congregation of Columbia, seeks to build a respectful, just and safe community where all our foreign-born friends and neighbors may thrive and prosper.

Specifically, the Coalition seeks to end the Intergovernmental Service Agreement between Howard County and U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement to house immigrant detainees in the Jessup facility and to enact laws to protect immigrants from discrimination.

Sadly, the MD General Assembly adjourned its 2020 session prematurely because of the COVID-19 pandemic and none of the immigrants' rights bills advocated by the statewide UU Legislative Ministry of Maryland were passed, although HB 403 which dealt with prohibiting immigration enforcement in schools, hospitals and courthouses did pass the House of Delegates overwhelmingly, 93-45. We'll begin again next January to advocate for these bills.
