We have begun our yearly stewardship campaign, and an informational packet should be reaching your email inboxes real soon now. Kudos to the most excellent Stewardship Team, headed by the intrepid Dan V. One of my favorite things about our stewardship campaigns is the sharing of testimonials from our members, and today's service, featuring lovely sentiments from Lynne S. and Ken H., did not disappoint. You should be contacted by a canvasser to schedule a conversation in the coming weeks, and, while these conversations are not required, I would implore you to seize this opportunity to share with and better get to know about a fellow Member or Friend of the Church.

The pandemic seems to be on the wane, and as you may be well aware of by now, the Board has voted to relax some of the COVID-19 restrictions in our worship services. An email went out earlier this week with the details. We are hoping to continue in this vein as the pandemic measurements continue to trend downward.

Finally, I have some good (but not stellar) news to share with you about worship space. Starting sometime in April we should be holding worship services at Claret Hall in Clarksville. The facility has significant storage space, has a separate room to rent for children's RE, and is significantly cheaper to rent than Robinson Nature Center. We plan to rent for at least one year, which should give the Space Team a bit of a well-deserved respite. The location, while more of a haul for those of us from Baltimore County, is not far from Channing's first home, Pointer's Run Elementary School.

Discussions and announcements:

- Congregational meeting to vote on adopting an 8th principle has been postponed to April 24
- Board is considering hiring a part-time treasurer/bookkeeper/administrator to reduce the Treasurer's responsibilities
- Effective mid-April we are changing our Sunday worship location from Robinson Nature Center to Claret Hall at River Hill in Clarksville

Motions passed:

- 1. to authorize the conduct of a plant sale again this year.
- 2. to approve the 21/22 budget revisions.
- 3. to Increase in-person attendance limit to 25.
- 4. to keep mask requirement for attendees, but worship team can go maskless from a distance.
- 5. to formalize dropping of mask requirement for outside socializing. People are always free to wear a mask outside, and their choice to do so should be respected.
- 6. To resume snacks, but not coffee, post service.
- 7. to rent Park Avenue for another year at \$2250/month + incidentals.



Crisis in Ukraine

Eighty years ago when Europe experienced horrendous refugee and humanitarian crises, the Unitarians, through their Service Committee, responded with aid and assistance. Now, Europe and the people of Ukraine face a devastating, aggressive invasion, violence and death. Again, Unitarian Universalists can respond. The UU Service Committee recommends donations to the following organizations that will be responding directly:

Mission to Ukraine

Toni R. has identified an additional way to help Ukrainian refugees.

Toni learned from two associates, one of whom is from Ukraine, about a mission by two young men, Mark Kreynovich and Dillon Carroll, to provide aid during the catastrophic invasion of Ukraine. Mark is from Ukraine but lives in New York. He and Dillon went to Europe to help people fleeing from Ukraine, supplying them with crucial medicines, food and other day-to-day necessities. Toni has contributed to their aid fund and finds them to be credible and transparent.

Mark begins his story like this:

Hi, my name is Mark Kreynovich. I am from Kharkiv, Ukraine. My Grandpa is currently in Kharkiv. I immigrated to the US when I was six months old and spent every summer in Ukraine through college. I would be called to the front-lines if I was in Ukraine right now. Despite that, I'm sitting comfortably in NYC. My parent's childhood friends (now ages 50+) and my friends in Ukraine are actively fighting, and millions are displaced.

In a recent update, he indicated that after nearly two weeks on the ground, they have refined their supply chain to quickly and smoothly deliver critical supplies to Ukraine. They have learned the ins and outs of necessary customs forms for a variety of gear moving between Poland and Ukraine, packaged and repackaged sensitive goods like insulin, made close connections with two pharmacies in Vienna to fulfill

their direct orders from the trauma surgeons in Cherkasy, Ukraine, determined the best warehouses and distributions centers on the Ukrainian border, and more. They have reached their fundraising goal of \$80,000 and have now raised the goal to \$100,000.
