## Minister's Musings



Dear Channing Members and Friends,

I am blessed to have a window at my home office which overlooks our backyard, full of gardens, grass, and the occasional critter. I observe trees, bushes, and flowers when in season. The garden is always enriched by colors of brown and green or by flower petals mimicking a sunset. To me, the beauty is always amplified with the changing of the seasons. What will fall to the wayside, and what will emerge in its place? Right now, I see the brown death of winter beginning to transition to new life as budding green foliage becomes more abundant. In reflecting upon these changing seasons, I thought, this morning, of liminal space. We spoke about liminal space during a recent worship service. Liminal space is that time between two marked endpoints to pause, reflect, grow, and change. It is a space between where you have been and where you are going. In nature, I think of the pause between the death of fall and the birth of spring - the pause of winter. I think, too, of the liminal space of our church community. I think of the marked transition we have navigated between uncertainty and stability.

Where were we last fall? We had a worship space, but no long-term lease. We had a church office, but had been in search of a new, more suitable space to inhabit. In short, we were uncertain, unstable, and in that transient mindset we have known for so long. We had no true, permanent space. We entered our own liminal time just as winter settled in, asking, what would happen next? Where would we reside? For how long? During this in-between time of winter, we had groups working in the background to negotiate, search, and plan. Now, as I watch the green emerge from brown outside my window, I watch our church transform from uncertainty to stability.

We have tangible gifts - budding flowers! - as we blossom and bloom this spring. We have a pending five-year lease with Epiphany Lutheran Church, and a three-year lease at an office space at Courthouse Square. We will save a substantial amount of money in office space rental costs. What a wel-

come stability! We were searching, and now we have a home. We were uncertain, and now we are reaching stability. Imperfect, yes. But we are dedicated to making the space into what we need. What intangible gifts are blooming this spring? Emotions of safety, stability, and homecoming, perhaps. Peace of mind, reassurance, calm, and security. Let us also highlight the love you share with one another. Has that grown in this liminality, as we lean on one another for stability, rather than a building? Has our commitment to this beloved church grown, celebrating all that strengthens and sustains us no matter where we are geographically?

What else have we gained during this time of pause, reflection, and change? We have had an influx of visitors as we transitioned into a more permanent worship space. We have seen a growth in volunteering - we now have eight volunteers dedicated to worship each week - that is remarkable! We are blooming indeed! Think of all we can focus on now which was difficult to commit to during our time of transience: Growth, community presence, implementing our Strategic Plan, reflecting on who we are as a faith community. And may we do this, together, as Channing Memorial Church.

**2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday Collection for Beans and Bags for Bridges**

On Sunday, April 14<sup>th</sup>, we will have a special collection to support a fundraising event for Bridges to Housing Stability. Bridges to Housing Stability is a non-profit organization serving Howard County. Their mission is to “provide a path to self-sufficiency to prevent and end homelessness through affordable housing solutions and advocacy in Howard County, Maryland.” Bridges not only provides crisis intervention, they also seek to offer stability in housing through permanent housing locator services, partnering with landlords to encourage them to provide affordable housing options and advocacy for affordable housing for low-income households and the elimination of homelessness in all communities.

The Beans and Bags for Bridges event will be held on Sunday, May 5<sup>th</sup> from 12:30-3pm at Centennial Park Pavilion H. The event will feature delicious chili from Absolutely Perfect Catering, live music, a silent auction, and a (friendly) cornhole tournament. In addition to giving generously, I hope that some of us will plan to attend the event to support their much needed work and to connect with other like-minded folks in the community.

The Outreach Team at Channing sees this as not only an opportunity to support a worthy cause, but also an opportunity to gain Channing some visibility. Our donation will support the work of Bridges and also get Channing a mention in the event program and on other event promotional materials.

## UUtheVote

The UUtheVote 2024 campaign is getting underway. Intersecting with several Unitarian Universalist Association programs such as Side With Love and the UU Service Committee's Love Resists, UUtheVote seeks to mobilize UUs, voters and local communities to understand the threats to our democracy, to engage with state action networks (like UULMMD) and collectively win on ballot measures that promote and affirm our UU values.

UUtheVote encourages congregations to become "Good Trouble" Congregations, honoring the late Congressman John Lewis who said, "Never, ever be afraid to make some noise and get in good trouble, necessary trouble."

To become a Good Trouble Congregation, Channing must meet these goals:

**Meet four total (at least two of each) to accomplish Good Trouble (GT) Congregation:**

### Organizing (meet at least two of six):

- Turn out 5 percent of members at a partner public action / witness
- Turn out 10 percent of members at UUTV political education event
- GT team table or canvasses at three (or more) public events
- At least 2 congregants are line warmers, poll workers, non-partisan poll observers, Election Defenders
- Reach 20 percent volunteer engagement in GT programming
- Act as Ballot Initiative Petition Hub or other ballot-related site

### Voter Contact (meet at least two of five):

- Average 20 postcards or letters per member
- Average 200 text messages per member
- Average 20 calls per member
- Average 20 doorknocks per member
- Average 10 ballot petition signatures per member

## **Channing Memorial Church, Unitarian Universalist**

We are a church of liberal religious worship that inspires its members on their spiritual journeys. We derive a common spiritual center from Jewish and Christian roots while drawing inspiration from other world religions; promote religious education for all ages; create a welcoming, supporting, and caring community; and work together to build a better world.

We meet at 9122 Sybert Drive, Ellicott City, MD 21043. Our Sunday worship service begins at 11:00 am.

**Directions from the North on Route 29:** Take Route 29 to Route 100 East, take first Exit Long Gate Parkway to stop sign (keep left at split). When traffic is clear, go straight across to Meadowbrook Lane, past the Park and Ride to the stop sign, turn right onto Sybert Drive. The church will be on your right.

**Directions from the South on Route 29:** Take Route 29 to Route 108, head East on Route 108 to first traffic light (Bendix Road), turn left onto Edgar Road; at stop sign turn right, then in two blocks turn left onto Parkvale Road. Continue to stop sign, then turn left onto Sybert Drive. The church will be on your right.
