President's Column

As I write this on a fine, Spring afternoon, I have a lot of important things to tell you about, so let's dive right in!

First, the Canvass has been a great success. We've raised 95% of our goal, and we'll likely reach 100%. We did it! I am so very heartened by our stepping up and showing both our collective love and our collective commitment to this community that means so much to us as we move into the future -- together.

And speaking of the future, the question of space, both for worship and for all the other functions of our Church, looms large. At this point, there are several possibilities:

- 1) We continue to rent separate spaces for Sunday morning worship and office/storage/ other functions, while saving and raising money for buying a future property.
- 2) We rent unified space from Dickey Memorial Presbyterian Church in Dickeyville, Baltimore, while saving and raising money for buying a future property. There will be a lot of information about this in a congregational survey.
- 3) We quickly conduct a capital campaign to buy an ideal property that is available now. This is hypothetical, but it wasn't just a little while ago. The Jehovah's Witness Kingdom Hall on Centennial Lane (just south of Frederick Road) was recently up for sale. The Board and Space Team want to gauge the willingness of the Congregation to make this kind of purchase if another opportunity comes up in the near future.

These possibilities are diverse, and the Board and Space Team really want input from the Congregation. To this end, there will be a congregational survey in your email boxes real soon now, and on May 16th after service, we will be having a facilitated congregational meeting to share the results of said survey and to discuss space related issues.

So now we have *two* big congregational meetings in May, the space meeting on May 16th and our annual meeting on May 23rd. With respect to the latter, I have an update. The 8th Principle Team wants more time to work through various issues with the Congregation and has requested that the Congregational vote on the 8th Principle be moved to Fall 2021. We will still have a vote on an update to the Bylaws, and you should have received a summary of these changes, with rationales, along with a link to the proposed updated Bylaws in your email.

Last, but not least, the UUA's General Assembly is coming up in June. It will be virtual, and Channing can send up to two delegates. The Church would pay the admission fee, and in return, delegates would attend in good faith and prepare a brief report about their experiences to share with the Congregation. This is a good opportunity to participate in the larger world of Unitarian Universalism, without travel costs! Please contact Reverend Jane or a Board member if you are interested

Phew! I'm just over 500 words, so I'll end here. Thank you for your attention.

Dear Channing members and friends,

Board Bits

The Board approved the 8th Principle Committee charge. The 8th Principle Committee will continue to lead the congregation in working through the proposed principle, looking toward a possible vote on adopting the principle in Fall 2021.

The Board decided to seek interest from the congregation for individuals to serve as delegates to this year's UUA General Assembly. (See page 8 for more information.)

The Stewardship Team reported that we are at 95% of our canvass goal.

The Worship Team briefed the Board on costs and needs associated with offering online/in-person hybrid worship once in-person worship becomes viable.

Rev. Jane reported that the Worship Team is working with Cedarhurst UU Fellowship to share some virtual worship services over the summer.

The Space Team reported on the space search. At this time, in-person worship space is difficult to find due to COVID-19 restrictions, but the search continues. The team is looking at potential options to replace our current office/storage/small meeting space, and will also approach our current landlord at Park Ave. to determine a path forward. They are also meeting with members of Dickey Memorial Presbyterian Church, which has presented a possible space option. The Space Team will be presenting a survey to the congregation regarding possible space options; this will be followed by a congregational space search discussion on May 16.

There are numerous references in this reading that can lead you to such explorations as: The Spirituality of the Earth, by Thomas Berry (ratical.org / https://ratical.org/many_worlds/SpiritOfEarth.html These thoughts can lead us into contemplation of the interdependent web and what it means to us as a people and as a church.

From the essay:

The subject with which we are concerned is the spirituality of the earth. By this I do not mean a spirituality that is directed toward an appreciation of the earth. I speak of the earth as subject, not as object. I am concerned with the maternal principle out of which we were born and whence we derive all that we are and all that we have. In our totality we are born of the earth. We are earthlings. The earth is our origin, our nourishment, our sup port, our guide. Our spirituality itself is earth-derived. If there is no spirituality in the earth, then there is no spirituality in ourselves. The human and the earth are totally imply cated each in the other.

On June 12, we will read The Bluest Eye by Toni Morrison.

Spectacular even alongside other early novels bathed in the blood of gothic dread—William Faulkner's "As I Lay Dying" (1930), say, or Flannery O'Connor's "Wise Blood" or Ralph Ellison's "Invisible Man" (both published in 1952)—

Interested in General Assembly This Year?



General Assembly (https://www.uua.org/ga) is the annual meeting of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). Participants worship, witness, learn, connect, and make policy for the UUA through democratic process. Anyone can attend General Assembly; registration is \$200 per participant.

Certified congregations (including Channing Memorial Church) can send delegates who can vote on behalf of their church. Based on our size, we can send two voting delegates. Registration, including the \$200 fee, is also required for Channing voting delegates.

This year's General Assembly will be held virtually June 23-27, 2021. The theme this year is Circle 'Round for Justice, Healing, and Courage.

If you are a member of the congregation and are interested in serving as a Channing delegate, please let someone on the Channing Board know. Channing will pay the registration fee for the two voting delegates. The expectation would be that the delegates would attend as much of the virtual program as possible, and then report back to the Board and/or Congregation regarding lessons learned and the overall experience. (Note that three of the assembly days are weekdays, which, depending on your schedule, might require using vacation time in order to participate.) The virtual nature of this year's assembly provides a relatively low-cost way to learn more about General Assembly, and help inform whether the congregation would want to send delegates to inperson assembly when it occurs.

Here Come The Cicadas!

Has it been 17 years already? It's almost time for the Brood X periodical cicadas to emerge from the ground and raise a ruckus for a few weeks. Hooray!

Although we hear cicadas every summer, those are dog-day or annual cicadas. Periodical cicadas emerge every 17 years, with different broods emerging In different years. In Maryland, this year's Brood X is the largest group, last seen in 2004.


We'll see the adults emerge around mid-May. These cicadas will be smaller than the green dogday cicadas, and they have more red-orange coloring. A week after emergence, the adult cicadas will mate and the females will deposit eggs at the ends of tree branches. The eggs hatch in six weeks and the young will drop to the ground where they burrow into the soil and feed on tree roots.

Cicadas and you:

- Cicadas don't bite or sting, and are harmless to people. They pose no health threat, but consumption in large numbers by pets should be discouraged.
- You may notice exit holes or "mud chimneys" in your lawn from the emerging nymphs. This will not permanently harm your lawn.
- Young cicadas feed on parts of trees, but there will be no lasting damage to established ones. If you have a new tree or a smaller ornamental or fruit tree, consider covering it with insect netting. If you're considering planting a new tree or shrub, you might want to wait until the fall.
- Cicadas will molt and leave the old shell behind. If you have a pond, consider covering it with screening during this time.
- Male cicadas have a droning mating song that you'll hear from trees. This can be a bit loud! Enjoy it while it lasts.
