Minister's Column

Dear Channing members and friends,



Nearly every Sunday afternoon, my husband Eric and I pack up a bag of snacks, lace up our hiking boots, and begin a journey in our car from cul-de-sac filled suburbs to tamed farmlands to largely untouched, remote parks, filled with trees and underbrush. Spring is my favorite time to hike, because I get to watch in realtime the earth and vegetation shift from a cold, dry, brown to lush, revitalized greens,

purples, and blues. My favorite are the flowers - those first vibrant petals of the season, peppering the ground with color and fragrance. These past few Sundays, traversing the increasingly bright terrain, I've been thinking about the budding and blossoming of our church community - we have a worship home! And we have been attracted to this new church building as a bumblebee to a daffodil - joining together for worship and coffee hour that feeds our souls and brings us to life.

And yet for a flower to blossom and grow, it must be tended to. The flower needs water and nutrients soaked up from the earth below, wind or flying insects spreading the life-giving pollen, and sunlight turned to nutrients in the outstretched leaves. Along with this beautiful, new space, our community has its own needs, which are plentiful - Religious Education volunteers, Zoom tech help, after-worship cleanup, and Outreach Team members, to name a few. To flourish, we each need to contribute.

Volunteering is a spiritual practice, just like a pause in meditation, a walk in nature, or a whispered prayer to all that is holy. It connects us to something greater than ourselves - our church community, with its collective search for spiritual growth. Often, just like nutrients below the earth, the work is unseen, unheard, and uncelebrated - committee meetings, emails, coordination, or website updates. And yet even the

President's Column



Dear Volunteers,

This is a love letter to you.

I'm writing it during the week of April 17-23, National Volunteer Week. This week, part of Global Volunteer Month, is a time to recognize and thank "volunteers who lend their time, talent and voice to make a difference in their communities." (www.pointsoflight.com) While my writing style, more formal than flowery, isn't the type you'll find in a Hallmark card, I hope it conveys the admiration and affection I feel when I think about you, the volunteers who are the backbone of our congregation.

In case you need a reminder, you are immensely important. Immensely important to our church community and to me personally. When I am feeling overwhelmed with my own volunteer commitments, tired of both the tedium and challenges I am facing, forgetful of why I volunteered in the first place, and just plain old grumpy about missing out on whatever I am missing out on while I finish the task at hand, I look around, and I see you.

I see you showing up. Showing up to do what needs to be done even when you feel over-whelmed or tired or just plain grumpy. I see you active and engaged in our community, in all kinds of ways, despite the tedium and challenges in your path. I see you giving your time freely, trusting that even the smallest acts can ripple into significant results, a leap of faith that is sometimes difficult for me to make. And I want to be like you.

You know that volunteering can be enriching and satisfying and fun. You've been there. But you've also experienced the frustration and exhaustion that can come at the end of good intentions. You're energetic, but I know you get tired. Your spirits seem unflagging, but at times, you're discouraged. I suspect you sometimes ask: Why am I doing this? Am I making a difference? Does anyone even care anyway? And, while you understand that doing committee work can often resemble herding cats, you sign up to do it anyway.

Your work is a ministry in the purest sense. Giving of yourself to help others is the essence of both volunteering and ministry. For some of you, volunteering may be a spiritual practice and, for others, an ethical calling. But, at its core, volunteer ministry, like all ministry, is about bringing love, however you define it, into the world. When you, who are uniquely gifted, offer your time and talents wherever and whenever you can, you help create the kind of world you want to live in. And I want to live there with you.



Thank You from UU Legislative Ministry of MD for a Successful Session

The MD General Assembly introduced and considered more than 2,200 bills during the 2023 legislative session that adjourned April 10. When the General Assembly adjourned "sine die," 30 of the UU Legislative Ministry of MD's 67 priority bills had passed (45%). In terms of issues (rather than individual bills), the record is even better: 20 of 36 issues (56%).

Climate Change - of 12 issues supported, six passed.

Criminal Justice - of the 5 measures supported, none passed. However, HB 201 – Capital Budget – includes \$3 million to build the first Pre-Release Unit for Women required by <u>HB</u> 801/SB 684 passed in 2020 with UULM-MD support (with the prior Governor's veto overridden in 2021).

Gun Violence - of the 6 issues supported, 3 passed.

Healthcare – 8 of the 9 measures supported passed:

Immigration - of the 3 measures supported, two passed.

Medical Aid in Dying - did not pass.

Directions to Epiphany from the North on Route 29: Take Route 29 to Route 100 East, take first Exit Long Gate Parkway to stop sign (keep left at split). When traffic is clear, go straight across to Meadowbrook Lane, past the Park and Ride to the stop sign, turn right onto Sybert Drive; Epiphany will be on your right.

Directions to Epiphany from the South on Route 29: Take Route 29 to Route 108, head East on Route 108 to first traffic light (Bendix Road), turn left onto Edgar Road; at stop sign turn right, then in two blocks turn left onto Parkvale Road. Continue to stop sign, then turn left onto Sybert Drive. Epiphany will be on your right.
