June Minister's Column

I always love this time of year, when the bugs start their loud, evening chorus, when daily walks no longer require a sweatshirt, when I can watch the critters jumping from tree to tree during my morning coffee. And yet, this spring is different. We are now routinely wearing masks, standing six feet apart, and only leaving home for the essentials. This can be hard, lonely, and stressful, and perhaps lead to a financial burden. Yet, this is what keeps us, and those around us, safe.

The Board met to discuss the most recent guidance issued by the state, county, and the UUA. The Board decided to meet virtually for worship through December and to hold small groups virtually through the end of August. At that point, we will re-evaluate. I want to reiterate here that we will revisit the issue at that time, we may not be together for well past December.

I know for many folks, this news will be hard to digest. We all miss each other and that physical togetherness. Yet as we hold space for this, let us be reminded of our Seven Principles of Unitarian Universalism, and the key pieces of those principles that guide us in staying home.

Religious gatherings are considered high-risk. When we consider gathering, we always need to think of our interdependent web. Each of our actions has a ripple effect, affecting so many of those around us. When making choices about going out, we need to especially think of those vulnerable folks – the elderly, those with pre-existing conditions. Risk-taking affects more than our individual selves. Let us remember, many of our members are high-risk.

We also need to keep in mind accessibility and inclusion in our worship spaces. Joining together too soon could not only put people's health at risk, but we risk exclusion of those vulnerable folks, with some of us gathering together while many of us simply cannot. It is so important to make our worship space accessible, even if that means putting off meeting in person for a bit.

The May 19 Board meeting covered three main topics: the Minister's report, review of the pandemic impacts, and follow-ups on the space search plan.

We are still seeing a high attendance for Sunday services as well as interest from new visitors. We discussed the Linden Hall lease and how to deal with the changing guidance for church gatherings. We pondered how long we should continue with online services and when we should allow small groups to gather at our Park Ave. space.

The decision was made that we will not have any gatherings at the Park Ave. house through August and we will revisit the topic for September and beyond. The space search is continuing slowly. We contacted *Stewardship 4 Us,* a UUA related organization, for guidance with our search. We are still finalizing our contract with Linda Odum, the realtor we are working with.

President's Column

At the May board meeting, the board looked at the UUA, county, and state guidance, as well as information from a webinar on the dangers of group singing at this time. We decided at this time to not meet in person for worship through the end of December. If there is a dramatic change in the virus situation, the board is free to re-evaluate earlier, but this helps the congregation and our volunteers shift our energy and focus to maintaining our virtual connection over several months. We can focus on other projects and move the congregation forward.

We also decided to not allow small group gatherings nor renters at Park Avenue through the end of August. This decision will be re-evaluated in September.

What follows are my thoughts in my last column as your president. I am not speaking on behalf of the board, but rather sharing my own thoughts about how we can navigate this time and the complex decisions that we face.

First, we need to look to our mission: Invite seekers into spiritual community, connect souls in mystery and wonder, and ignite compassion into action. How can we best fulfill this mission? This mission makes us, as a church, have different concerns than other organizations and businesses during this crisis.

The central question for us, in my view, will be: What is the quality of our "invitation" and "connection" online, versus what we could offer if we did meet in person with many alterations in place, such as no singing and masks required? Over time as restrictions lift and the virus situation improves, we can consider when we can better fulfill our mission with in-person worship or small gatherings. When we do meet in person, we will want to think about offering clear masks and face shields to attendees if face coverings are still recommended by the authorities.

Second, we need to look to our values and principles as Unitarian Universalists. We subscribe to seven principles. The UUA's statements about why they are recommending that congregations focus on a virtual presence through May 2021 are grounded in UU values. Of course, we can agree to uphold UU values and then have disagreements on how best to apply these values. As we navigate through this difficult landscape, it will be helpful for teams and committees to periodically revisit UU values and then see how that helps to inform decisions.

Third, we should think back to some of the lessons offered in the Small Congregation webinars offered in the past year. One theme of the webinars was that as a small church, we have strengths and should focus on those strengths, rather than try to fulfill all possible needs and wants. We run the risk of volunteer burnout if we try to offer all the programs of a larger church. Extending these points to the pandemic, we need to be mindful that everyone is collectively going through a stressful time. People are sleeping more, feeling tired, dealing with financial stresses, having children home from school, and worrying about health. Our volunteers may not have the same energy reserves to give to the church as before. The best way to support our members and friends may be to choose a few areas of focus and let go of other areas for the time being. I see connection and emotional support as key areas of focus.

Finally, I want to thank this year's board for their work during this challenging time: Evelyn, Maureen, Ken, Kathleen, Rev. Jane, and Colleen. I am also grateful to the new members joining the board next year for bravely stepping in: Mel, David, and Patrick.

Based on advice from the UUA, we have applied for and received a Payroll Protection Plan loan to assure the continued salary and benefits of our Minister and Music Director.


Reminders

If you lead a committee or team that will need to spend money next fiscal year, please send a budget request to me as soon as possible if you haven't already done so. The Board will approve the final budget at its next meeting on June 16.

Soul Matters for June

Our Soul Matters theme for the month of June is Compassion.

I truly believe we can never focus too much on the power of compassion and the power of practicing this daily. We care for ourselves and we care for one another. I lift up a quote from American Trappist monk, writer, and theologian Thomas Merton, "The whole idea of compassion is based on a keen awareness of the interdependence of all these living beings, which are all part of one another and all involved in one another." We are more aware than ever of our interdependent web. That compassion we so generously offer others ripples out to bring peace and kindness to those we have never even met, and it begins with self.

Each month, we offer Small Groups to reflect on the monthly theme. These Small Groups are special because they allow each member to deeply engage with the topic in multiple ways. UUtheVote



We've seen the "breaking news" on cable, broadcast and streaming television, the headlines that interrupt our web browsing—all reporting about brave Wisconsinites standing six feet apart to exercise their right to vote in the midst of the Covid-19 pandemic. We've read the stories about the absentee ballot fiasco in Ohio. These stories tell us one thing for certain—that our democracy is in danger. Efforts to disenfranchise

certain ethnic groups, to make it difficult to register and to vote are prevalent throughout the country. And the Covid-19 pandemic has given new opportunities to those who wish to suppress votes and voters. For this reason, the Unitarian Universalist Association has launched <u>UUtheVote</u>, a call to UUs to ensure that our nation conducts free and fair elections

Channing Memorial Church, as part of the Baltimore UU Cluster and in partnership with the UU Legislative Ministry of Maryland, is establishing an Electoral Justice Team to coordinate ways that our members, friends, young adults and youth can help to protect and promote our democracy.

We will be distributing a survey soon that will list various opportunities and ask you to identify ways you are willing to participate. Opportunities might include volunteering with voter outreach efforts of local organizations, phone-banking and text-banking with a local justice partner organization to get out the vote, registering high school students who may be eligible to vote in November 2020, providing assistance in completing mail-in ballots to those who are impaired, and more.

As Rev. Dr. Susan Frederick-Gray has asked us to respond, let's make Channing "a hub of spiritual sustenance" during this coming election and work to protect and sustain our democracy.

A New Adult RE Offering: Clearing as a Spiritual Practice



No one would argue that most of us do too much or have more possessions than we need. Or both. With our lives swept up in a swirl of attachments, worry, and endless, mechanical "doing," our minds become fuzzy on what stays and what goes, what matters and what doesn't. As humans, it is in our nature to experience clarity and spaciousness all the time. The problem is that we lose focus, get off balance, and forget how.

So how do we dial it back or even begin to reduce the noise, release the stuff that doesn't serve and support us, and connect with that which makes our hearts sing?

One minute at a time. In present time.

No matter how minuscule the task or effort, the fact is that clearing anything consciously and gently ... creates an energetic opening-- a spaciousness-- that will work on you slowly and surely to soften your attachments to things, beliefs, and outcomes.

In this 6 week course, we'll explore space clearing from the inside out with the help of Stephanie Bennett Vogt's book, *Your Spacious Self*. Our six weeks of work and play will include one Zoom gathering per week, plus (manageable) reading and practice outside of class. Course work (in and outside of Zoom class sessions) will include reading, reflection, journaling, gentle practical work, meditation, and verbal sharing. *Stephanie Bennet Vogt's approach strongly emphasizes the inner dimension of clearing*.

Participants will need access to a copy of *Your Spacious Self. The book is available on Amazon in paperback and Kindle.* (Used copies are also available on Amazon, but for only a little less than the Kindle price.)

The <u>UUA, SideWithLove</u>, and UUSJ have endorsed the PPC -- a leadership <u>council</u> has been formed (recent UU history with PPC here).

We understand that COVID-19 has forced the nation into an unprecedented emergency, unlike anything in our living memories. Yet the PPC's <u>Souls of Poor Folks Audit</u> and <u>Moral Budget</u> show that the current emergency results from a deeper and much longer-term crisis — that of poverty and inequality, and of a society that <u>has long ignored the needs of 140 million people who are poor or one emergency away from being poor</u>. Long after the pandemic ends, folks will continue to suffer needlessly unless we change the moral compass of our democracy.

Recall, in 1968, **Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.** and many others -- including UUs -- called for a "revolution of values" in America and sought to build a broad movement that could unite poor and dispossessed communities across the country. Today, the PPC has picked up this work. People across the nation have joined under the banner of the Campaign to confront the interlocking evils of systemic racism, poverty, climate change and ecological devastation, militarism and the war economy, and the distorted moral narrative of religious nationalism.

As UUs we are called to live our values and drive for justice. We were present for the civil rights movement and we must be present for this new moral fusion movement. So we educate, mobilize, and advocate to change the structural oppressions that constrain the greatness of our nation. That means we are for just, compassionate, and sustainable policies and programs to address what **Rev. Dr. William Barber II** terms the "systemic policy violence against poor people" and the dispossessed in American society (**Statement: Budget Committee**, U.S. House of Representatives).

June 20th is a movement milestone, not the goal. The goal is a beloved community of our nation's peoples. Join the movement!

Turn right at the first light on Old Annapolis Road.

You will be behind the Dorsey Search Village Center. Take the third entry road on the left (Old Route 108).
