

President's Column



Dear Members and Friends,

It's May—the end of our church year and time for the annual meeting.

Let's all exhale.

It feels like we've been going nonstop for a long time, which is no surprise because we've covered so much ground this year. Last July, we were worshiping together exclusively in online Zoom rooms. By September, we alternated between in-person worship services at Robinson Nature Center and online services. Today we have a new home at Epiphany Lutheran Church, where our services are live-streamed, allowing all members and friends to worship together regardless of where they are seated.

Getting where we are today has taken much time, effort, and creativity. Yet, through all the twists and turns and ups and downs in the work of individuals, teams, and committees, one thing has undergirded everything we have done: the belief that keeping our beloved community connected is at the heart and soul of this church.

There was much to figure out and much work to be done.

We saw our determined and dedicated Worship team facing new challenges every Sunday to create an environment conducive to transformational worship for everyone, whether you entered through a front door or a waiting room.

When it became clear that our services at Robinson Nature Center would have to be recorded and broadcast after the service on YouTube, Rev. Jane offered a virtual community (Tuesdays After) so everyone, whether they watched the recording or were in attendance, could more deeply connect with the worship themes together. We could not simultaneously share the Candles of Joys and Concerns ritual in the sanctuary and online, so Rev. Jane offered it on Saturday nights when everyone could gather on Zoom.

The work of all the iterations of our Space Team bore fruit this year when we signed a oneyear lease with Epiphany Lutheran Church. Members of this team could have understandably stepped back and rested. But there was a need to manage the transition to our new space and they were right there for us.

A newly formed tech team took on our goal of finding a workable, affordable process to deliver high-quality multi-platform services from Epiphany. In what felt like the blink of an eye, we were together in one "room" because they puzzled out the difficult task of live streaming, allowing us to be spiritually linked.

Greeters, ushers, and hosts appeared at the "doors" of our worship spaces, connecting us with their welcoming spirit, whether our services were at Robinson Nature Center, online, or at Epiphany.

Even as we began to come together in person, our Zoom rooms remained full of meaningful ways to stay connected and have deep relationships. The number of offerings was remarkable! Our Young Adult group met monthly for Soul Matters discussions and Game Nights.

There were various Adult Religious Education classes, including Lectio Divina, Death Café, Building Your Own Theology, and Wisdom Tales. Our ministry groups like Covenant Circle and Clearing Circle, Men's Group, Soul Collage, and Book Group came together regularly.

Our Park Avenue space continued to be put to good use as individuals and groups, seeing our need for time together, offered outside events such as book discussions, dessert gatherings, cookie exchanges, Strawberry Socials, time around a campfire, and "just because" get-togethers.

The connected efforts of many teams enhanced our ability to join with the larger community. Our Outreach and Growth Committee worked to increase our visibility. Our Membership Committee contacted inquiring people and supported new members and friends. Our Social Justice Advocacy, Social Responsibility, and Afghan Resettlement teams guided us to ways of influencing the world outside our walls. Rev. Jane's participation in interfaith and denominational activities brought us into wider spiritual circles.

Our Leadership, Development, and Nominating committee connected us in gratitude as they reminded us that many hands do our community's work.

We were unified in celebrating our past and future at the celebration of our 30th Anniversary and Rev. Jane's installation and Full Fellowship.

We came together when we answered the call of our Stewardship Team.

We met in safe, clean, well-maintained spaces at Park Avenue and Epiphany because of the efforts of our Facilities Team and the lovely individuals who have been cleaning our new space during our transition.

Our Committee on Ministry supported Rev. Jane in her desire to deeply connect with us as individuals as well as to all aspects of our church community.

We came together across generations thanks to our Auction Team. And we continue to come together throughout the year thanks to many social events that were auctioned off.

Feelings of belonging deepened with every act of support and concern expressed by our Care Team.

We were aligned with our denomination as the 8th Principle Team guided us through studying essential considerations in expressing our UU values.

Our bonds strengthened over coffee and snacks, thanks to our Hospitality Team.

Our Finance Team's wise stewardship of our combined financial resources made it possible for us to do so many things and to do them so well.

And where would we be without our Communication Team? There's no coming together if we don't know where to go.

Stewardship Corner

As we approach the end of the Channing Memorial Church, Unitarian Universalist church year, here is some information regarding stewardship that you might find useful, especially if you are new to CMC.

Fiscal year: CMC's fiscal year extends from July 1 through June 30. This corresponds to the fiscal year of the Unitarian Universalist Association/Central Eastern Region.
Pledge campaign (also called the annual canvass): The annual canvass which we conducted in March and April covers the upcoming fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023. We received \$152,270 in pledges, which fell short of our goal of \$165,000. Our "official" canvass drive is over, but you may make a new pledge or amend your pledge any time during the year.

How to contribute to Channing Memorial Church:

• **By check**: be sure to indicate in the memo line what the payment is for—pledge payment with the church year designated or other donation. This is especially helpful when we are transitioning from the current church year to a new church year.

• **Cash:** loose cash placed in the offering on Sunday is gratefully accepted as a plate donation, but there is no way of knowing who made the donation. If you would like your cash donation to be recorded or applied to your pledge, please place it in an envelope with your name on it indicating whether it is a pledge payment for the current church year or other donation.

• **Paypal**: see the Channing Memorial Church web page for directions on how to donate (there is another Channing Memorial Church in Rhode Island. Be sure you are in the correct web page).

• **Qualified charitable distribution:** If you are age 72 or older, you may direct your required minimum distribution to CMC. Check with your financial advisor and let the Channing treasurer know if you need specific wording on your donation statement.

• **Stock donations**: Stock donations are gratefully accepted. Let the treasurer know if you plan to make a stock donation. This requires some coordination between your stock broker and our investment administrator.

• **Planned giving:** Think about including Channing Memorial Church, Unitarian Universalist in your will. You will hear more about this in the coming year.

For your information, Evelyn Grim will complete her term and Maureen Hayes will begin her term as treasurer effective July 1.

Channing Memorial Church, Unitarian Universalist

Our mission is to invite seekers into spiritual community, connect souls in mystery and wonder, and ignite compassion into action.

We are a church of liberal religious worship that inspires its members on their spiritual journeys. We derive a common spiritual center from Jewish and Christian roots while drawing inspiration from other world religions; promote religious education for all ages; create a welcoming, supporting, and caring community; and work together to build a better world.

Directions to Epiphany from the North on Route 29: Take Route 29 to Route 100 East, take first Exit Long Gate Parkway to stop sign (keep left at split). When traffic is clear, go straight across to Meadowbrook Lane, past the Park and Ride to the stop sign, turn right onto Sybert Drive; Epiphany will be on your right.

Directions to Epiphany from the South on Route 29: Take Route 29 to Route 108, head East on Route 108 to first traffic light (Bendix Road), turn left onto Edgar Road; at stop sign turn right, then in two blocks turn left onto Parkvale Road. Continue to stop sign, then turn left onto Sybert Drive. Epiphany will be on your right.
