President's Column



I love to sing. I'm not very good at it, though. While I am familiar with some of the mnemonic devices to help remember the notes on a scale (Every Good Boy Does Fine), I can't read music, am lost when it comes to music theory (pitch, tone, timbre, huh??), and my lack of rhythm is downright embarrassing at times. No matter. I love to lift my voice in song.

I have a playlist called "Sing Out Loud." I put it together at a difficult time when my father was dying. It's a collection of old and new favorites, some of which have memories and meaning attached to them, while others appeal to me for some combination of lyrics and music theory that call to my heart and soul for reasons I don't understand. I find comfort and inspiration in singing these songs.

Recently I added my first hymn to this playlist. *Wake Now, My Senses*. This song is a perfect fit for "Sing Out Loud" because I find it both comforting and inspiring, especially when singing it in church.

We need both comfort and inspiration in a faith community. Feeling physically and emotionally safe grounds us and gives us a solid base from which to do our work. We're less likely to feel overwhelmed by everything that's going on around us if we have a space where we feel accepted and cared for. We feel renewed and energized when we've had a chance to rest in comfort.

And yet, as important as feelings of comfort are, feeling uncomfortable is also necessary to live a meaningful life. Too much comfort can make us stay where we are rather than find the courage to do hard things. Discomfort can be the nudge or push that moves us toward growth and accomplishment.

One important aspect of a faith community is its role in helping people intentionally walk into discomfort. Making a difference in the world requires change. Creating change in the world requires change in ourselves and change in the way things have always been done. Discomfort asks us to do things we are not familiar with, that we are uncomfortable with, and often things we'd rather leave to someone else to do. It requires us to consider unfamiliar, sometimes challenging perspectives. It requires us to take risks, as individuals and as faith communities. Discomfort pushes us toward spiritual growth.

Inspiration pushes us toward spiritual growth, as well.

When we pause and consider the meaning and purpose of what we do and why we do it, it creates a doorway for inspiration to enter. We need this inspiration because it awakens our creativity and imagination. It allows us to see possibilities and find the motivation to do the work that needs to be done. Inspiration connects us to the beliefs and hopes that resonate deep within us. Inspiration calls us to follow the spiritual impulse to transcend our limitations and believe we can breathe life into our vision of a world transformed.

I find comfort in singing Wake Now My Senses because the words send me to a place of reflection, and the music, with its encouraging, compassionate quality, allows me to stay (continued on page 4)

there. The song inspires me because it touches my heart, my mind, and my spirit for reasons I don't understand. And because it captures the essence of what I believe and value.

Our work together this year will require us to walk from safety into discomfort. It will also require us to sustain a community of safe harbor for ourselves and each other because this is where we can find renewal. In this mix of comfort, discomfort, and renewal, we can find inspiration. If we open our hearts, and minds, and spirits to it, this inspiration will certainly move us toward a shared vision of a planet transformed by our care.

The Board began its first meeting of the new fiscal year by welcoming new members Maureen Hayes as Treasurer and Chris Lynch as member at large. The Board again discussed future plans for renting space at Epiphany and at Park Avenue. Input from the congregation will be solicited in September.

Angela shared her experience at General Assembly. Highlights included preliminary approval of the amended Article II and election of Rev. Dr. Sofia Betancourt as president of the UUA.

The Board discussed the need for reviewing Channing's governance structure. Angela agreed to attend the Helpful Board Habits Retreat on August 5th. The Music Director Search Team is actively working to advertise and recruit a new music director. The RE Search Committee is looking to recruit a couple more people to help. We plan to start some RE classes in the fall.

Mission of the Music Program

Channing Memorial Church -- DRAFT IN PROGRESS (7/17/2023)

The mission of the music program is an extension of the Channing Memorial Church mission to invite seekers into spiritual community, connect souls in mystery and wonder, and ignite compassion into action.

Our particular mission is to:

- Invite a diverse, multi-generational audience into spiritual community through inspiring music from a wide variety of musical genres.
 - Strengthen and expand choir repertoire and music library.
 - Incorporate instrumentalists (drummers, cellists, etc.).
- Work with the worship team, providing engaging music that works synergistically with the rest of the liturgy to inspire, inform, and spiritually nurture the congregation.
 - Deepen the choir's understanding of the flow of worship and the choir's role in it.
 - Integrate music and liturgy into smoothly flowing worship services.
- Engage the congregation with the power and variety of music and movement to enrich the spiritual, communal, and individual experience of all who attend our services.
 - Lead congregational singing in creative ways, building musical awareness.
 - Incorporate simple rhythm instruments for the congregation, as appropriate.
- Create opportunities for deep connection and discovery through the choir as a small-group ministry.
 - Invite members into the choir.
 - Engage in community-building.
 - Work with singers with a broad range of musical experience and skill levels.
 - Acknowledge and support individual member's gifts and needs.

- Instruct vocal training and theory to grow musically.
- Emphasize the meaning of music and lyrics.
- Encourage spiritual growth and exploration through music.
- Create a welcoming, embracing environment in the choir for people of all races, ethnicities, gender identities, and abilities.
 - Include ways to participate for those not available to commit to the ongoing choir.
- Leverage resources of the AUUMM, UUA, and other support organizations to amplify the power and reach of our programs, our mission, our 8 principles, and our values.

Long-Term Vision of the Music Program

Our long-term vision includes the following possibilities, as we develop our music ministry:

- Engage with organizations and faith institutions from the larger community (including UU and interfaith communities) through shared programs, theirs and ours.
- Bring the transformative power of music to those in need in our surrounding community.
- Use music to promote justice, equity and compassion for all races, ethnicities, gender identities, and abilities.
- Create a voice in the community by showing up and representing Channing Memorial Church at area events and by bringing programs out into the community.

Channing Memorial Church, Unitarian Universalist

Our mission is to invite seekers into spiritual community, connect souls in mystery and wonder, and ignite compassion into action.

We are a church of liberal religious worship that inspires its members on their spiritual journeys. We derive a common spiritual center from Jewish and Christian roots while drawing inspiration from other world religions; promote religious education for all ages; create a welcoming, supporting, and caring community; and work together to build a better world.

We meet at Epiphany Lutheran Church, 9122 Sybert Drive, Ellicott City, MD 21043. Our Sunday worship service begins at 11:00 am.

Directions to Epiphany from the North on Route 29: Take Route 29 to Route 100 East, take first Exit Long Gate Parkway to stop sign (keep left at split). When traffic is clear, go straight across to Meadowbrook Lane, past the Park and Ride to the stop sign, turn right onto Sybert Drive; Epiphany will be on your right.

Directions to Epiphany from the South on Route 29: Take Route 29 to Route 108, head East on Route 108 to first traffic light (Bendix Road), turn left onto Edgar Road; at stop sign turn right, then in two blocks turn left onto Parkvale Road. Continue to stop sign, then turn left onto Sybert Drive. Epiphany will be on your right.
