The Board approved the Music Director Search Team's request for funds for a substitute musician to relieve Stephen occasionally while we continue searching for a replacement. Lynne Schaefer has stepped up to chair the RE Search Team. They will be meeting soon to coordinate next steps.

The Space Team presented their views on ways to continue working with Epiphany Lutheran. Action item: Kris and Dan plan to meet with Epiphany leaders to gauge their interest in continuing our partnership.

The Board discussed potential dates for a Board Retreat, to include LDNC and other interested members. The retreat will examine our governance structure and ways to keep our church functioning well.

# **President's Column**

It's October, and things are in full swing here at Channing Memorial Church.

Reverend Jane returned from study/vacation leave in August and hit the ground running. Our ritual of Water Communion in September marked our coming together for a new church year. Committees and teams have been meeting, socializing has been happening, "Sundays After" and other group discussions and explorations have reconvened, and the board has a few meetings under its belt.

We're on the move!

As is true every year, the agendas for board meetings are full. Today, I'd like to highlight four of the many important items currently before the board. These items are of particular importance because work on them is unfolding now, they will be best served by robust congregational involvement, and they have a significant impact on church life now and into the future. Here's an update.

# **Epiphany Lutheran Church**

Last April, we entered into a lease agreement with Epiphany Lutheran Church for a period of one year. Much has happened since then. I'm wondering, how is it going for you?

What has your experience at Epiphany been like this year? What has been going well for you? What are your areas of concern? How suitable a match is Epiphany for us?



These are some of the questions the board has been discussing, and I hope you've been thinking about them, as well. Our future at Epiphany is one of the most important questions our congregation will grapple with this year. The board aims to have this discernment process be inclusive, accessible, and transparent.

Thinking this through will be a participatory process involving information sharing, collaboration, deep listening, and reflection. The board's first step is to meet with leaders from Epiphany to gauge their interest in continuing our partnership and under what terms. Keep your eye out for notice of how this and other information will be shared.

## **Church Structure and Governance**



Like churches worldwide, we have confronted many challenges over the past few years. The Covid-19 pandemic, as well as cultural shifts in church participation and function have impacted all aspects of church life, from how we worship to how we engage with the larger world. The world of church in general and our church in particular has changed.

It's time for us to take a fresh look at our structure and governance, as they make up the foundation of our spiritual home. A thoughtful examination of this foundation will help us better understand what is and isn't serving us well and help us better navigate the complexities of church life in a changing time. A strong and well-considered church

structure and governance will help ensure our church's healthy functioning now and into the future.

With this in mind, the board is currently working with the staff of the Central East Region (CER) of the UUA to arrange a facilitated day-long retreat on church structure and governance involving members of the board, the Leadership Development and Nominating Committee (LDNC) and members who express interest in this issue. The retreat will explicitly focus on the needs of small congregations. If you are interested in participating in this retreat, please let a board member know.

#### **Religious Education for Children and Youth**



Our congregation has a strong history of supporting religious education for children and youth. My own entry into Channing was through my children, which is to say, through the RE program over 25 years ago. In recent years, however, we have struggled to bring our vision of a vibrant RE program to life.

In order to move forward with rebuilding an RE program, the board designated funding for a part-time RE professional in this year's budget. We are very fortunate that Lynne, Cathy, and Rosie have agreed to be part of a team that will coordinate this effort. I am incredibly grateful for their involvement, the perspective each of them brings to this work, and their commitment to our future.

When my husband and I walked through Channing's doors all those years ago, I was just happy to find an RE program with an open-minded and inclusive approach to spirituality. However, as my children grew and I watched them navigate the world, I began to deeply appreciate how the core values of Unitarian Universalism can provide a foundation for an engaged and fulfilling life.

Today's world can be a tough place to grow up in. Providing a safe, supportive space for young people to explore their beliefs and values, interact with diverse perspectives, learn to engage in the world, and have fun is more than a worthy endeavor. Let's make this happen!

#### **Music Director Search Process**

The search for our new music director began last June when the Music Director Search Team (MDST) was formed. The team, consisting of Pam, Jim V., Ken G., and Rev. Jane, is deeply engaged in finding someone well-suited to our congregation.



The board recognizes that music ministry plays a profound role in our church. Not only does music enhance our worship ex-

perience, it helps foster spiritual growth, and a sense of community. The board is very grateful for the knowledge, skill, and determination the MDST members bring to the charge and is committed to wholeheartedly supporting their work.

# The New Jim Crow: A discussion with Rev. Jane

Join Rev. Jane for a discussion of Michelle Alexander's book <u>*The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration in the Age of Colorblindness*</u>. Today's justice system keeps Black lives at the bottom of society, continuing and maintaining a caste system in America. While we no longer live alongside slavery or in the Jim Crow era of the late 19th and early 20th centuries, Michelle Alexander reflects, "We have not ended racial caste in America; we have merely redesigned it."

To elaborate, "By targeting Black men through the War on Drugs and decimating communities of color, the US criminal justice system functions as a contemporary system of racial control - relegating millions to a permanent second-class status even as it formally adheres to the principle of colorblindness."

I look forward to this opportunity for reflection, discussion, education and growth. **Saturday, Nov. 11, 10 till noon at Park Avenue.**

We are a church of liberal religious worship that inspires its members on their spiritual journeys. We derive a common spiritual center from Jewish and Christian roots while drawing inspiration from other world religions; promote religious education for all ages; create a welcoming, supporting, and caring community; and work together to build a better world.

We meet at Epiphany Lutheran Church, 9122 Sybert Drive, Ellicott City, MD 21043. Our Sunday worship service begins at 11:00 am.

**Directions to Epiphany from the North on Route 29:** Take Route 29 to Route 100 East, take first Exit Long Gate Parkway to stop sign (keep left at split). When traffic is clear, go straight across to Meadowbrook Lane, past the Park and Ride to the stop sign, turn right onto Sybert Drive; Epiphany will be on your right.

**Directions to Epiphany from the South on Route 29:** Take Route 29 to Route 108, head East on Route 108 to first traffic light (Bendix Road), turn left onto Edgar Road; at stop sign turn right, then in two blocks turn left onto Parkvale Road. Continue to stop sign, then turn left onto Sybert Drive. Epiphany will be on your right.
