Minister's Column



Dear Channing members and friends,

Each morning, when I leave my house, I feel the temperature slowly cooling. Last Sunday, I went on a hike, and, for the first time of the season, I was bundled up in a hat and scarf! In late afternoon, the sky is already darkening, and soon rain will transition to snow. Not only

are the trees changing, now barren of leaves, things are changing at church, too.

We recently made a change to improve the quality of our worship services. Live services are now recorded and posted online. Some of us may be nervous about this - any change can be uneasy and unsettling. I have heard questions about the effects this may have on our community. Know that we still have so many ways to connect as a beloved community. I encourage folks to join me for Tuesdays After and our Saturday evening Joys and Concerns sessions. You are each loved and held within the unceasing embrace of our beloved community. We are a church that has survived so much flux and change, and we are sturdy and remarkable!

There are other changes that occur as green grass turns brown. Our nights are getting consistently longer, and this darkness can create within many of us a depression. Be gentle with yourself. If you need it, I invite you to seek help. Likewise, Thanksgiving can offer great pressure. For those who celebrate Christmas, or those who do not but who still feel the stresses and malaise in the community, we are entering a season that may be filled with anxiety and high expectations. May we all pause and breathe. May we know solace and comfort in "good enough." May we be reminded that true joy is found in generosity, conviviality, love, and connection, not the perfect gift or baked-just-right turkey and pie. Let us be kind and gentle to ourselves. Let us be kind to others - we do not know what each person is carrying.

How can we celebrate and spread joy as a church community? This month, we'll swap cookies, we'll sing around a firepit, we'll light Silent Night candles and reminisce on this past year during solstice. We have some opportunities to en-

On a recent sunny, Saturday afternoon, the Worship Team guided a group of Channing's members and friends in a brainstorming party. The purpose was to capture ideas and inspiration for the winter season's liturgy from the collective creativity of the people gathered. The event centered on Wonder, the December Soul Matters theme. With this activity was the promise of exploring how winter holiday traditions beckon us along the path of wonder.

The idea of wonder is so closely associated with the winter holidays that many of us feel called to create winter wonderlands all around us. We hang lights, decorate our homes and communities, host festive parties and serve traditional foods. We light candles, bake cookies, play games and send cards. We fill our homes with sights and sounds and smells that comfort us and allow us to make connections to our inner landscape, to others, and to our sacred.

Yet, finding the time to honor these connections isn't easy amid all the busyness and distraction that's around us. We face the demands of work and family responsibilities. We might feel the stress of high expectations or the anxiety that comes when holiday expenses strain our budgets. We may experience the low energy of depression or the exhaustion that can come with travel or hosting out-of-town guests. Yielding to an emotion like wonder, which asks us pause and look and listen can feel like an unaffordable indulgence. We ask ourselves, *How can I connect with the wonder of the season when I barely have time to brush my hair?*

Maybe part of the answer lies in engagement with people, places, and things that ground us and turn our attention toward what matters. Our faith communities are one place where this can happen. They can help us reframe the way we interact with holiday traditions by helping us see them as doorways to the sacred rather than as tasks that must be done. They can remind us that we are part of something greater than ourselves, as this is easy to forget.

I need to be reminded that sharing symbolic gestures like lighting candles and hanging lights can be expressions of hope and rebirth. That making Great Grandma's Pecan Snowball cookies is more than rolling the nut-filled shortbread balls in powdered sugar. It is an act that honors past generations, and passing on this tradition to children and grandchildren creates lasting memories and connects us to our roots.

I'd like to be reminded that everything on the holiday dinner table doesn't have to be homemade. But including Aunt Edna's special stuffing on the menu (despite all the cel-

ery and onions that had to be chopped to make it) can lead to treasured memories being shared and comfort given to those who loved her and miss her.

I want to be reminded that I can quiet my mind and shift to a more spiritual perspective, and that both spirituality and traditions allow us to create space for meaningful reflection.

And, I really should be reminded that time spent in relaxation and play will certainly hold moments of connection and wonder. Binge-watching classic Christmas movies is nothing to roll one's eyes at.

I am looking forward to the reminders that our seasonal activities here at Channing will provide. I am looking forward to the worship services with their stories and sermons and songs that will help me connect more deeply with the holiday traditions I value. I'm excited about participating in our Third Annual Cookie Exchange and the time I'll get to spend in the company of people I care about. I'm grateful for our Blue Holidays tradition and the way it creates a space of comfort and support for people struggling this holiday season. I value the holiday traditions that are part of our church community and enjoy thinking about ways to reintroduce traditions from our past and invent new ones for our future.

This holiday season, I hope to heed the reminders found here at Channing to pause and look and listen more often, and to be open to the beautiful and the unexpected that is around me and within me. I hope to feel small and connected and in community. I hope my winter holiday traditions lead me down a path of wonder. And I hope yours do, too.

In 2013, the Administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Gina McCarthy, declared that the two most pressing environmental issues are: 1) climate change, and 2) the growing divide between people and nature. While climate change is increasingly obvious, the growing divide is significant because those who are personally connected to nature make more conscientious decisions regarding the environment.

Members of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Columbia, initiated a collaboration with Cradlerock Children's Center, Community Ecology Institute at Freetown Farm, and UPCYCLED to establish a nourishing garden at OBIC.

Our motto is "growing minds, loving hearts and helping hands", says Amanda Morton, Executive Director of Cradlerock Children's Center.
