Gift Card Scam Alert!, or "Counterfeit Clergy Cash Cow"

Beth Casebolt of the UUA's Central East Region cautions that scammers are posing as ministers and sending emails asking for gift cards.

They may use an email address that is similar to the minister's and take advantage of folks' trust and goodwill. Victims became suspicious when the "minister" asked the congregant to send him the numbers to access the gift card instead of bringing the gift cards to church.

The UUA stresses that ministers will **not** reach out and ask that gift cards be sent anywhere. If an email looks suspicious, congregants should reach out to the sender through a different channel (the established email address, a phone call, etc.) to verify. Remember, if an email looks fishy, check it out before you proceed.

Waking Up is part seeker's memoir and part exploration of the scientific underpinnings of spirituality. No other book marries contemplative wisdom and modern science in this way, and no author other than Sam Harris-a scientist, philosopher, and famous skeptic-could write it.

Job Searching?



Inclement Weather Procedures at Channing





- I. Once a decision has been made to cancel Sunday services- or if Linden Hall is closed- the following will happen:
 - the president of the congregation will send an All Channing email by 8 am on Sunday morning and will also post it on the church website.
 - The closing notice may also be available on the phone system as well, depending on the availability of volunteers with those technical skills.
- 2. For **all other church activities**, the responsibility for making decisions about events and meetings falls on the leader(s) of the activity.
 - Those leaders need to alert their attendees, if needed, about cancellations.
 - For an all-congregation activity, leaders should send an email to newsshare to be sent as an All Channing notice. Contact Julie by email or text and she will get it out quickly, or Ken H. may be contacted by phone.
- 3. Rogers Avenue/Court House Drive is expected to be plowed and cleared quickly during weather events. The courthouse public lot should be cleared quickly since the Sheriff's office is nearby. However, please note that the church parking lot itself may or may not be treated, depending on the response time of church volunteers.
- 4. At the Park Avenue office, please use appropriate caution at all times; assume that any wet pavement in freezing weather could be ice and test it out before walking on it. If you are at the office and notice a patch of ice, please help keep everyone safe and put out some salt.
- 5. As a general principle, we recommend using Rogers Avenue/Court House Drive to reach the Church office during winter weather. Don't come up the steep hill from Main Street.

Directions to Linden Hall: .From the South:

Drive north on Rt. 29 from south of Columbia.

Take Rt. 108 West.

Turn right onto Columbia Road.

Turn right at the first light on Old Annapolis Road.

You will be behind the Dorsey Search Village Center. Take the third entry road on the left (Old Route 108).

The parking lot is immediately on your right. Overflow spaces available at other locations in the Village Center.

From Baltimore:

Take 70W to Rt. 29 south.

Take Rt. 108 West.

Turn right onto Columbia Road.

Turn right at the first light on Old Annapolis Road.

You will be behind the Dorsey Search Village Center. Take the third entry road on the left (Old Route 108).

The parking lot is immediately on your right. Overflow spaces available at other locations in the Village Center.
