As I write this, November looms nigh, the nights have become deliciously chilly, and I've somehow managed to break my heel. Thank you all for your thoughts, prayers, and well-wishes. The road to recovery will be long, but I shall not be deterred. And appropriately, this month I share some thoughts about some longer term goals for our Church.

The first is our ongoing Eighth Principle work. I know that some of you consider the adoption of the Eighth Principle to be a "no-brainer", and I know that some of you consider it to be a "no-wayer." If you are in either of these camps, I would urge you to take a step back from your preformed notions. We have a problem with racism in our nation, and we have a problem with racism in our denomination. Both denying the problem and arguing about wording are ways of avoiding the real, difficult, and meaningful work of looking it in the face and making inroads towards real progress. I implore you attend the various discussions with both an open mind and an open heart.

The second is stewardship and our search for future worship space. Most of you should have a copy of the Stewardship for Us report by Liz Coit (contact any Board Member if you need a copy). I plan to write more specifically in future columns about it, but for now I'll say that the report provides an honest picture of where we are, and it lays the foundations for us to decide where we are going. How we do Stewardship will be the key. As for the space search, the Board and the Space Team are communicating well. Real estate is not cheap in this area, and we are working hard to find a range of options for the Congregation to consider.

Let us not be deterred.

Loving Hearts Helping Hands (LH3) to Make Blessing Bags



LH3 is ready to begin our first project of the church year and we need your help! We will be assembling bags of supplies that can be given to folks in need. The bags will contain bottles of water, non-perishable snacks, hand warmers, socks, tissues and other basic necessities. Please consider donating the various items we need to assemble the bags. Our goal is to assemble 100 bags.

Sign up to donate <u>HERE</u>. Select the item, hit the Select and Sign Up button and then choose how many of the item you wish to donate. **The deadline for donations is Wednesday, November 4**th.

There are two ways to get the donations to us.

- (1) Drop the items off at the Park Ave. office. There is a waterproof tote box by the back door. Place your items in there. We will go by the office every few days to move them indoors.
- (2) Or have the items shipped to Kathleen R.

Once we have all the items, we will organize a drive by pickup for the LH3 team. We will assemble the bags and then return them to the same waterproof tote at Park Ave. where they will be available for folks to pick up.

Soul Matters for November: Healing

Each and every one of us suffers – that is a part of the human condition. We are all wounded. What varies, however, is how we react to this

wounding. Theologian Henri J. M. Nouwen writes, "Nobody escapes being wounded. We all are wounded people, whether physically, emotionally, mentally, or spiritually. The main question is not 'How can we hide our wounds?' so we don't have to be embarrassed, but 'How can we put our woundedness in the service of others?" Let us not be ashamed but – if it feels healthy – use our experiences to aid another. Sometimes, the best thing we can do is to offer a familiar ear. This is a powerful act of healing! Author Bell Hooks writes, "rarely, if ever, are any of us healed in isolation. Healing is an act of communion." This month we embrace that act of communion, joining together as a sacred community to heal. Together as a church, we will work to heal both our own personal wounds and the wounds emerging from society at large.

Healing is our worship theme for November, and the theme for our small groups. These small groups are special because they allow each member to deeply engage with the topic in multiple ways. In preparation for each month's Small Group, I will send each group member a packet. You are invited to select from this packet one spiritual exercise and one question to reflect on before our meeting together. While reviewing the packet ahead of time is a great way to prepare for group, please do not let a busy schedule deter you from participating. Whatever amount of time you are able to dedicate to preparation is just the right amount of time!

I ask that you sign up ahead of time. Please use the link below. Please provide me your email address so that I can send you the packet for you to review. I will also provide all attendees a Zoom link the day of the Small Group. If the slot that you can attend is full, just let me know. We have opened our small groups to the public to share our gifts with the community. Feel free to invite friends. I am excited to explore the topic of Healing with you!

8th Principle Work at Channing Memorial Church

As Unitarian Universalists, we covenant to live together by our 7 Principles. Our faith is calling out for an 8th. The 8th Principle reads,

We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote: journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions.

We decided as a congregation to begin exploring the 8th Principle. We have a committee to help guide us through the process.

First, we will do the anti-racist, anti-oppression work outlined in this Principle. There will be multiple opportunities for this offered throughout the church year. We are already scheduling Adult Religious Education opportunities. This allows us to live the values outlined in the Principle. Keep an eye out in church announcements!

The second part of this work is adopting the 8th Principle into our bylaws. This will occur after congregation-wide discussions. At the end of the church year, we will have a congregational vote on whether we would like to adopt this Principle as a church.

Soulful Home Programming

We have some exciting new programming coming up for parents and caregivers who are raising the next generation of Unitarian Universalists! In partnership with First Church in Salem, UU, we are introducing the new Soul Matters pro-



gram "Soulful Home" in a five-month pilot program beginning in November. This is a small group ministry that welcomes meaning-seekers of all ages to explore questions such as "What does it mean to be a family of Deep Listening?" in a warm, interactive setting. We will gather each month for a check-in, an interactive story, an intergenerational activity, and special time for guided discussion among caregivers. We will also offer a monthly discovery packet for those who wish to explore our themes and practices as a family. November 12 Meeting: For book club regular discussion that is upcoming on the second Thursday, November 12 at 10 a.m., we'll read *Racism as Zoological Witchcraft: A Guide to Getting Out* by Ko

Amazon writes: In this scintillating combination of critical race theory, social commentary, veganism, and gender analysis, media studies scholar Aph Ko offers a compelling vision of a reimagined social justice movement marked by a deconstruction of the conceptual framework that keeps activists silo-ed fighting their various oppressions—and one another. Through a subtle and extended examination of Jordan Peele's hit 2017 movie Get Out, Ko shows the many ways that white supremacist notions of animality and race exist through the consumption and exploitation of flesh. She demonstrates how a critical historical and social understanding of anti-Blackness can provide the pathway to genuine liberation.
