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President's Column



As I write this on a crisp and deliciously cool morning, the vernal equinox just passed, I find myself delighted to make reacquaintance with my sweater. This morning's worship service featured a sermon by Reverend David Carl Olson of the First Unitarian Church of Baltimore, who spoke on Pope Francis's thoughts about the pandemic. To paraphrase, the pandemic has given us time to see, time to choose, and time to act. Coupled with the story "Super Tiny", artfully told by Worship Associate Pam E., the messages really hit home with me. This is why I come to church.

At the last Board Meeting we acknowledged that there is a real and growing hunger in our community to see and meet each other in person. While we hope for things to improve, the Delta variant of COVID 19 continues to run rampant among the unvaccinated, and the latest UUA guidelines, (https://www.uua.org/leadership/library/delta-guidance), are quite cautious. Masking and social distancing are strongly encouraged, even for outdoor gatherings, though for small outdoor gatherings among fully vaccinated people, covenantal consent to mask or not may be employed. I believe that the book discussion on Mel C.'s Just Before Too Late outside our Park Avenue space was a successful merging of socializing and safety, and these lovely Fall days should afford us more such opportunities.

Speaking of Park Avenue, we have negotiated a significantly reduced rent for the space (down to \$900/month from \$2000/month), but we must rent until at least the end of April, 2022. This gives the Space Team some breathing room as they continue to search for accessible office space and Sunday worship space. As always, fingers crossed.

Finally, from the "Where are we going?" department, the intrepid team of Pam E., Patrick B., and Angela L. have worked hard over the summer with consultant Liz Coit of Stewardship for Us to draft a strategic plan. Here's a key sentence from its introduction:

The strategic plan--including this foundational document--aims to be an iterative, living, cocreated document, destined not to gather dust on our shelves, but to hold a permanent place in our back pockets, on our tech devices, and in all our meetings and activities.

The Board and the planning team are still ironing out details, but in the meantime, proposed actions for this year will be shared with the various teams and committees of the Church to prepare for the upcoming Council of Committees this month. Stay tuned.

From the September 21, 2021, Board of Trustees Meeting:

The Board discussed the 4th quarter Council of Committees Meeting. This meeting is a way for all the various teams and groups in the church to communicate their plans with one another. Each quarter, a different Board member facilitates the meeting. The October meeting will be facilitated by Kathleen Razmus.

The Board discussed and scheduled a Board retreat for Saturday, October 30th. An outside facilitator will be brought in for this one-day event.

The Board decided unanimously to continue with the current in-person meeting guidelines which include size limited outdoor meetings with social distancing. Small group indoor meetings are permitted with masking and social distancing in place. Park Ave. is not large enough to hold a small group indoor meeting with the required distancing. As always, care should be taken by group leaders to ensure that everyone in the group is comfortable with the meeting plans for the group.

The Board decided no changes are needed to our current voting procedures for the upcoming 8^{th} Principle vote.

The Board received and discussed a draft report from the Channing Strategic Planning Team. The team worked hard and are producing a comprehensive report covering the challenges and opportunities for the church. The Strategic Plan committee members are Pam E., Patrick B., and Angela L.

(The*All New*) Clearing as a Spiritual Practice

An adult RE/spiritual practice offering


Participants from the recently completed "Clearing as a Spiritual Practice," group have decided to continue, and renew, this work. Having worked through one of Stephanie Bennett Vogt's books, we'll be journeying, together, through a second, beginning in late October. Anyone interested is welcome to join us! (No prior experience with this author's work is required.)

On this journey, we'll explore space clearing from the inside out with the help of Vogt's book, *A Year for You: Release the Clutter, Reduce the Stress, Reclaim Your Life*, which is divided into 52 weeks of reading and practice. Participants will work through one (short) chapter per week on our own, and we'll meet together via Zoom once every two weeks. Course work and play (in and outside of Zoom sessions) will include reading, reflection, journaling, gentle practical work, and verbal sharing. Stephanie Bennet Vogt's approach strongly emphasizes the inner dimension of clearing.

Participants will need access to a copy of *A Year for You*. The book is available on <u>Amazon</u>, in paperback and on Kindle. (If you'd like to participate but are short on funds at this time, please contact Rev. Jane.)

Our first Zoom session will be **Thursday, October 28th** from 1—2:15 pm. Please read the introduction and the chapters for weeks 1 & 2 before the first session. I will facilitate the first Zoom session. Feel free to contact me (Ostara) with any questions.

On The Basis Of Sex Focuses On Ruth Bader Ginsburg

With the fate of 1973's *Roe v. Wade* hanging in the balance, watching *On the Basis of Sex* may be something of a bittersweet experience. This 2018 biopic of the late Ruth Bader Ginsburg will remind many of how much the absence of the staunchly liberal Supreme Court justice will be felt in the coming years.

The film centers on Justice Ginsburg's early career fighting for gender equality. The film particularly focuses on her role in *Moritz v. Commissioner*, ironically enough a case in which an obscure tax provision discriminated against men. Her success in arguing the case was a significant step forward in moving the courts to question the constitutionality of gender discrimination embedded in law, and helped to establish her reputation.

As someone who did not know much about Ginsburg's life and career, I found the film illuminating, and its storyline engaging. It's a good movie, though I admit to trying without success to identify what, exactly, keeps it from being a *great* one. The supporting cast is excellent. Felicity Jones's performance as the lead seems ... fine ... though maybe a little shy of what might be expected in portraying such a powerful figure. Perhaps it just isn't realistic to expect intense movie-level drama to come out of the nuance of courtroom rhetoric, even in cases of great importance.

At any rate, I recommend *On the Basis of Sex* as a solid and worthwhile drama. One of its more poignant moments comes in its coda, which notes that Ginsburg was ultimately approved to serve as justice on the Supreme Court by a vote of 96-3. The notion that such a liberal bastion received near-unanimous Senate endorsement seems unimaginable given today's polarized political climate.
